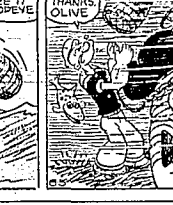

We agreed with all of it but the concluding homily.

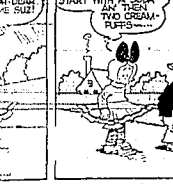

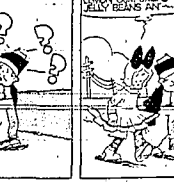

GOVERNOR SETS REPRIEVE LIMIT

Too Many Requests for Leniency, Bottolfsen Declares

BOISE, Aug. 4 (AP)—Governor C. A. Bottolfsen virtually considered his constitutionally granted power to reprieve prisoners in county jails and the state penitentiary to the state parole board today. He announced his decision after receiving a flood of applications for temporary releases, and after conferring with Warden P. C. Meredith on several requests from prisoners inmates.

All were denied. The chief executive noted that judges who save sentences have the right to suspend sentences in all worthy cases and that friends of convicted persons have the right to appeal to the judge—who informed of the circumstances—can "buy" commutation.

"Far too many requests for reprieves are coming to my office," the governor said. "The circumstances in most cases are by no means unusual and do not warrant release. I am particularly opposed to granting clemency to persons convicted of drunken driving because I feel they represent one of the most dangerous types of offenders. The parole board meets regularly each quarter and it is the duty of parole officers to refer to consider applications for clemency."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—The United States and Russia agreed today to continue in effect an agreement whereby Russia will supply the United States with American goods in the next 12 months and the United States will supply Russia with the same quantities of goods as countries with which it has trade agreements.

The agreement released the text of the agreement between the two nations. It is a modification of the agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union, A. I. Mikoyan, and Stuart E. Grummon, American charge d'affaires at Moscow, which put the extension of the agreement into effect Sunday, August 6.

With respect to Soviet coal shipments, the United States, Russia agreed to restrict its exports in the next 12 months to 400,000 tons. This was considered necessary because of the coal shortages of the revenue act of 1932.

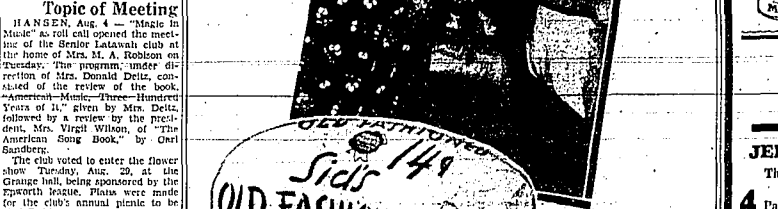
