Total fatalities for the first seven months of the year were 131, compared with 125 for the same period of 1938, Spencer said.

The seventh month has been a month of traffic fatalities by its own right with its all-time high record in the state of 102, but four less than the 106 automobile deaths in July.

CONGRESS OKAYS OGDEN AIR DEPOT

Delicency Bill Includes \$3,515,000 for Huge Army Base

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP) - Congress put its stamp of approval today on plans to construct a huge air depot adjoining the army's air camp at Ogden.

Under terms of the tented delicency appropriation bill, passed by the senate and house and sent to the president, the war department is authorized to enter into contracts totaling \$3,515,000 to build the depot.

The project will ultimately cost \$5,000,000 and was announced today by the war department when it made its request for congress for a supplemental appropriation to continue its expansion of land and air facilities.
