

Million - Dollar Blaze Destroys Boise Arena, Lumber Yard, Storage

500 Fight Fans Escape Flames; Firemen in Hour-Long Battle Prevent Spread to Gas Tanks

BOISE, Aug. 10.—Five hundred fight fans escaped injury tonight when a fire that cost an estimated loss of \$1,000,000 destroyed the Fairview boxing arena, a lumber yard and a warehouse containing \$750,000 worth of civilian conservation corps equipment.

The conflagration broke out in the Stone Lumber company yards, immediately adjoining the arena, shortly after 11:20 p. m. and for nearly an hour menaced huge nearby gasoline storage tanks.

Fire Chief Frank Pulasko, who called all of the city's fire fighting apparatus and firemen into action, announced at 11:30 p. m. that the blaze apparently was under control.

Firemen were unable to determine immediately the cause of the blaze. Lt. Col. G. W. Jones, commander of the reserve fire company, CCC dist. 6, estimated that the government equipment contained \$750,000 worth of property was insured.

The CCC equipment was stored in a building which housed the fight arena. The structure was owned by Mrs. H. H. Bryant of Boise, sister of Mrs. Ford, Detroit, Mich., automobile manufacturer. Mrs. Bryant, who is vacationing at Yellowstone, Idaho.

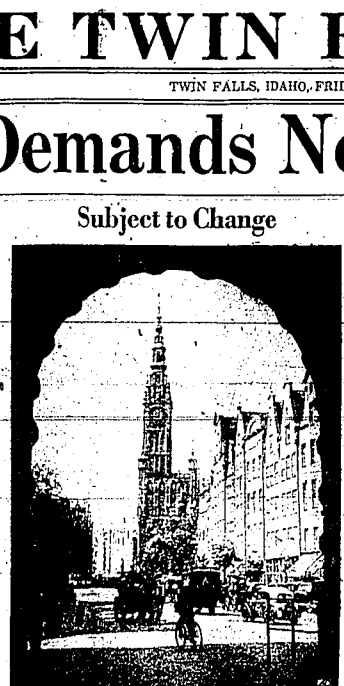

Poland Defied by Nazi Leader Danzig Hails Forster on Return from Talks with Hitler

(By The Associated Press) In a spectacular setting of storm troops and tanks, Hitler returned to hear the latest word from Adolf Hitler, Danzig's Nazi leader, who is expected to return to the city with German last night but who has no inkling of the future's immediate plans.

While he gave cues for his crowd of 40,000 listeners to shout "Heil Hitler" and "Heil to the Reich," a special train was carrying Italian foreign minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano, to Salzburg for a significant meeting with the German foreign minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop.

The Danzig issue promised to provide the outstanding item from the conference, although Berlin sources said the "whole gamut of international questions" affecting Italy and Germany would be covered.

Ciano's visit in Rome "expected Count Ciano would arrive against a German ultimatum on Danzig, that would be the end of the matter." Another prime topic expected to be brought into their conversation was the military alliance which Germany and Italy signed last May, and the economic and military centers in war time.



Legionnaire Vanguard Moves on Twin Falls Veteran Adjutant Finds All Ship-Shape for Convention

He was awarded three medals for bravery in action, but he refused command on it. Officers and enlisted men gathered in Paris and started the American Legion movement, first to be comprised of those who had served overseas.

HEAT, HOPPERS HIT CORN CROP

Indicated Production Slash Wipes Out Possibility of Quotas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Drought conditions on the great plains during July reduced the nation's 1939 corn prospects to 4,007,000 bushels, the agriculture department reported today, and thereby virtually wiped out the possibility of marketing quotas on the crop.

The first rains crop was hit hard in Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas but, the weather and entomologists, the crop prospecting board said in its monthly forecast of agricultural production.

A month ago, the corn crop was estimated to be the largest since 1922 and far in excess of the average for 1935-27, with a surplus of at least 425,000,000 bushels from present output.

The 1939 crop is estimated to be at levels which would have required the department to hold a former referendum on marketing.

BOUNTY TO BOOST WHEAT EXPORTS

Secretary Wallace Announces Change in Subsidy Program

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Secretary Wallace announced today a change in the agriculture department's wheat export subsidy program designed to "move the wheat into export more completely through the normal channels of trade."

In the future, the department will make bounty payments to exporters at rates to be regulated by the export and the government. In the past, the government bought wheat in domestic markets and sold it to exporters at reduced prices which would enable them to meet low foreign quotations.

Under the new program, the government will withdraw from actual buying and selling of wheat, leaving that to the exporters.

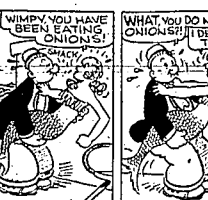

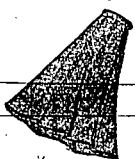
