

Wild Fire Saves Fire-Menaced North Idaho Town

INDIVIDUALISM SUSPECTED IN BOISE BLAZE

Police and Fire Departments Push Investigation After Finding Gasoline Can With Fingerprints

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Aug. 11.—Aashes of a conflagration that caused nearly \$1,000,000 damage and threatened the lives and health of 500 fight fans demolished today while police and fire officials probed possibilities of incendiarism.

Police Chief Austin Utley reported tonight that a two-ton can containing some gasoline and covered with fingerprints was found in a busy street in front of the buildings—starting the Parvley fire area—that burned in the fire that started last night at 10:30 o'clock.

The police department is assisting Fire Chief Frank Pulaski in investigating the cause of the fire, Utley announced.

"We have called police and fire departments of Salt Lake City, Seattle, San Francisco and Portland to furnish us any information they might have on the activities of incendiaries who might have set the fire."

Cause Undetermined Fire Chief Pulaski said: "We are making a thorough investigation, but have not learned the cause of the fire. It broke out so suddenly and progressed so rapidly and intensely that it is difficult to find out who started it. We can never know."

Meanwhile, James Allen, agent in charge of the Idaho State Police, who was an announced at the night, remained his work for the newspaper minutes after the fire. The structure was owned by Mrs. H. J. Bryan of Boise, sister of Mrs. Henry Ford, wife of the Detroit motor magnate, and her son, Melvin Bryan.

The building was in first class shape from the standpoint of equipment for protection of fires, said Bryan. It included 10 fire extinguishers, had approximately \$30,000 in the building and \$1,000 in personal property in it.

He said considerable insurance was carried.

Government's Loss Lt. Col. Charles Jones, commander of the western Idaho-Boise National Civilian Control and Relief district, estimated the federal government's loss in equipment at \$50,000, none of which was covered by insurance.

Another item which was lost included 144 trunks, six passenger automobiles, 1000 pairs of shoes, 1000 pairs of generating units, 6,000 mess kits, 2,000 blankets, shoes, clothing, tools, bedding and records. Lt. Col. Jones said.

Two Army Fliers Killed at Langley Field; Two Seamen Victims at San Diego

(By The Associated Press) Two plane crashes—one of an army plane near the Atlantic coast and the other of a navy plane near the Pacific—looked like a bad omen for the men who were both planes burned today. The army plane, a bi-motored bomber crashed and burned at the Langley field, a navy air base, killing two commissioned officers and seven enlisted men. The accident occurred as the plane took off for a routine navigation flight.

NEW TENSION ON EUROPEAN SCENE

Intense Diplomatic Activity Coincident With War Games

(By The Associated Press) Intense diplomatic activity throughout Europe reflected growing tension in the international situation Friday as hundreds of military and naval troops were called to the colors for fall maneuvers in Yugoslavia, Rumania and Italy.

Gale Drives Blaze to Outskirts of Village of 900 Persons then Shifts at Right Angles

(By The Associated Press) SPOKANE, Aug. 11.—A gale like wind that whipped a dying forest fire into fury today and blew it to the very edge of Spirit Lake, Idaho, shifted at right angles at the last minute and blew the flames away again.

Tonight a lull in the wind, which had switched and swerved all afternoon, gave hopes to the 1,000 fire fighters that the little mill village 45 miles northeast of here would remain safe. Only a few minutes' respite about face and considerable stiffening of the wind could bring near danger.

OBJECTIVES SET FOR REPUBLICANS

Party's Publicity Director Addresses Gathering of Idahoans

BOISE, Aug. 11 (AP)—The 1940 objectives of the Republican party is "to restore the country, economically," Franklin Whitaker of Washington, D. C., O. P. national publicity director, told 250 Republicans assembled here for the first time which was interpreted as a pledge to the 1940 campaign.

Whitaker, President Roosevelt "the greatest political gambler in the history of America," and added:

"His victims are the 11,000,000 unemployed, on whom he has tried one theory and then another, and one depression already has lasted five years too long."

"The Republican objective is to put those 11,000,000 unemployed back to work, and by that action many economic problems will evaporate."

FAST TO DEFEND

Whitaker voiced the view that Roosevelt planned to reek a third term, and said:

"Some Republican leaders are saying that they would welcome it, because Mr. Roosevelt would be the sure candidate to defeat."

He termed Senator Arthur Vandenberg (R-Michigan), Thomas Dewey of New York and Senator Robert Taft (R-Ohio) as the most talked of prospects for the Republican presidential nomination, and asserted:

"I am optimistic as to the party's future."

"I think a Republican will be elected to the presidency in 1940, and I have no doubt as to the increasing expressions of dissatisfaction over the new deal, the unemployment situation, the new taxes, increased taxes and mounting debts."

Among those attending the banquet were Governor C. A. Bottoliver, Lieutenant Governor Donald Whitehead, Senator Thomas Heath (R-Franklin), Republican state chairman and Ezra Willis of Coeur d'Alene, Republican national committee for Idaho.

Whitaker came to Boise from Spokane with Mrs. Whitman and Willis.

He will address another similar meeting at Pocatello tomorrow night.

Frank Burroughs, veteran Boise newspaperman, presided.

Senator Heath asserted he was "happy to report" the Republicans have "made a big job" of the party we slipped one foot into the door in 1928 and we're going to pry it wide open in 1940.

He expressed the hope that north Idaho would be represented well on the Republican ticket next year and added:

"If we are careful in our choice of candidates these obstructionists (Democrats) in the statehouse won't be with us anymore."

For Clean Sweep

Mr. Willis declared the last Congress, in killing various financial measures, "did much to restore the confidence of the people."

He attributed much of the credit to the Republican minority.

Governor Bottoliver, who introduced Whitaker, asserted his confidence in the party's future and declared that with the help of the members of the party the O. O. P. in Idaho "will be able to complete in 1940 its pledge to clean the statehouse out from cellar to garret."

Governor Bottoliver and Lieutenant Governor Whitehead were the only Republicans elected to executive office in 1938. The others were Democrats.

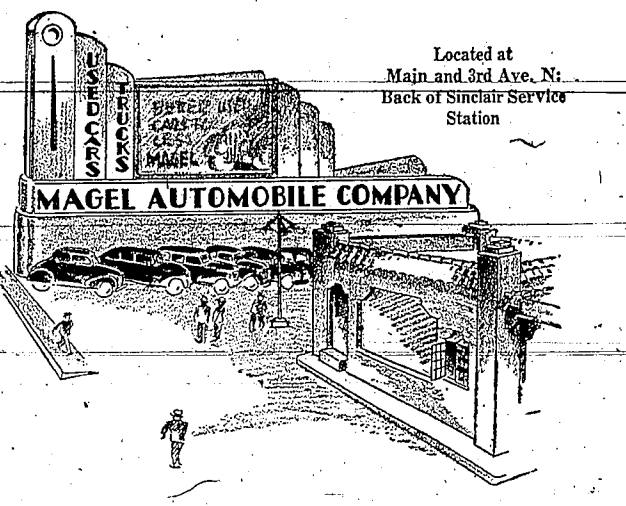
