HITLER EYES ROME-BERLIN AXIS OUTRE

Danzig Believed Important Topic in Conference of German, Italian Leaders At Fuehrer's Stronghold

ADOLF HITLER discussed the future course of the Rome-Berlin Axis in a lengthy meeting with the German and Italian foreign ministers Saturday and German sources said the subject will receive further attention today because of its "complexity."

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Cast Bound Streamliner Quits Track

Rock on Track Blamed for Derailment of 'City of San Francisco' in Vicinity of Carlin

RENO, Nev., Aug. 12.—The Southern Pacific said an undetermined number of persons were killed tonight when the streamliner "City of San Francisco" was derailed 200 miles east of Reno, in central Nevada tonight.

A large number of persons were believed injured. The chief dispatcher's office at Reno said at 17 of the train's cars left the track. Several of them plunged into the Humboldt river.

The train was traveling on Southern Pacific tracks at a point 15 miles west of Carlin, Nev. It was westbound en route from Chicago to San Francisco.

Case of the derailment could not be determined immediately, but unconfirmed reports from railroad men at Carlin and other points had struck a rock on the track. The accident occurred at 9:37 p. m. near Carlin, but because of the remoteness of the region, word did not reach Reno for some time.

At San Francisco the Southern Pacific and other railroads carried nurses, doctors and rescue equipment were going to the scene of the accident from Carlin and Sparks, Nev., and from Odean, Utah.

Swamp In River: Fremont reported at Sacramento from the dispatcher's office in Sparks, Nev., indicated that the "City of San Francisco" had struck a rock on the track. The number of passengers in the derailed cars was not available here.

The dispatcher said, however, he believed there were scores of them. Reports in the past few days of the engine and tender of the streamliner being struck by a rock in the investigation along the river.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Senator Pittman (D-Nev.) attacked tonight the administration's public lands policy, asserting that lands in the western states "are rapidly being acquired by a barony of the dictator at the head of the department of interior."

Pittman, who usually has supported the public land retention program, said he thought the western states ought to "stand together for their own good" in opposing the taking of land out of the channels of land ownership.

He said the western states have a very small vote but a much larger one than is carried by a smaller majority than the combined votes of those states.

He said that the administration "is making the most of it."

PRESIDENT MAPS FIGHT TO FINISH

Chief Executive Notifies Foes with Four Defiant Statements

 WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—With a defiant, fighting mood, President Roosevelt notified his foes this week that he was fighting to fight it out to a finish, with nothing but except compromise.

He made it clear—as plain as the flood-lit Capitol dome—that he will shut first of all that congress against the administration measures it booted about unmercifully last session; and then exert his very resources to obtain the nomination of a "liberal" Democratic presidential candidate, backed by a "liberal" platform.

From the tenor of his own remarks and the angry reports of his Democratic congressional opponents, it was immediately obvious that the bitterness of the new between the party's Roosevelt men and anti-Roosevelt men had increased.

In the new week, Washington politicians, it all united up to a conventional session of unrelenting strife next year, with, almost certainly, such a hard-fought pre-convention campaign as the country has never seen.

Controversy Grows
 After congress heard House, the members readily accepting the question whether the people would support the reforms after the president, the Democratic administration, a statement to make almost every day. And with each, the controversy grew.

On Tuesday, the Democratic leader, Barclay of Kentucky, said the next session would see a renewal of the all the measures of the lending-pending bill and of the amendments to the neutrality act, both which were rejected in the session just ended. He expressed confidence that congressional recalcitrance would find settlement at home.

On Monday, Mr. Roosevelt met opposition Democratic members, making that all the objectives of his 1937 court bill, which they fought tooth and nail, had been reached by the changed attitude of the court toward the constitutionality of social legislation and by piece-meal acts of congress.

On Tuesday, he accused those in congress who were responsible for the debate of the lending and neutrality bills of gambling that business would improve and that world peace would continue. He hoped, he said, that they would win both bets, but obviously he thought they had only a gambler's chance.

Climax of Week
 But the real climax of the week came on Thursday with a message to the convention of Young Democratic Party members, who were gathered in the Democratic party will fall if it goes conservative next year or if it is not conservative.

Mr. Roosevelt said, and he added that if conservative people were running on a "straddle-bug" platform are chosen.

"I, personally, for my own self respect, and because of my long service to and belief in liberal democracy, will find it impossible to have any active part in such an unfortunate suicide of the old Democratic party."

At the same time, without even hinting at the possibility of a third-term for himself, he expressed confidence the conservatives would not win, and said he thought the conservatives would see the political and national wisdom "of giving the voters an opportunity to maintain the policy of moving forward with a liberal and humanitarian program."

No one in Washington thinks of the 1940 campaign without thinking also of the third-term question. It is still unanswered, but it is obvious that whether Mr. Roosevelt runs again himself or settles upon a candidate representative of New Deal ideas and objectives he is determined that the issues involved shall be kept vividly prominent.

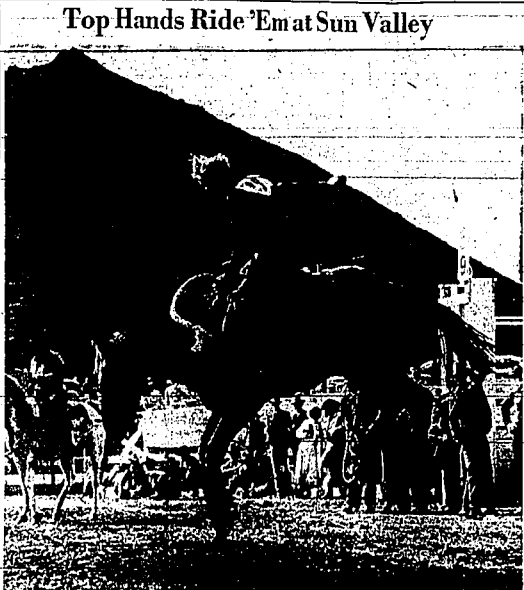

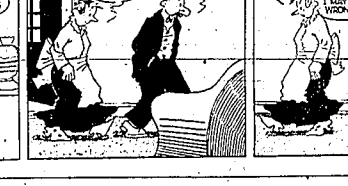

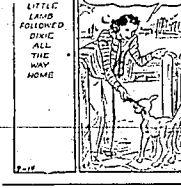
