

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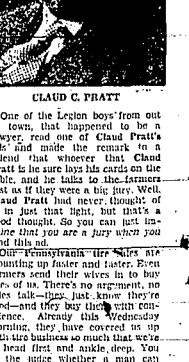

DEATH TOLL IN TRAFFIC RISES

Idaho Counts 25 Fatalities in July, Including Four Pedestrians

BOISE, Aug. 16 (AP)—Idaho's traffic fatalities jumped to 25 for July, counting the deaths of two persons who were injured in highway crashes in Shoshone county in June.

Four of the 25, Harry Basner, state law enforcement commissioner, reported, were pedestrians whose average age was 66 years.

Basner attributed 40 per cent of the accidents to speed too rapid for conditions.

Seventy-eight persons were put in hospitals by the traffic deaths.

"Signs along the highways slowing the rates of speed are primarily intended for information," Basner commented.

"They show the rate of speed for safe driving. In the opinion of the most competent authority—the engineer in charge of that particular portion of the road.

"Ten persons thought they knew more than the engineer during July, and five are now dead," Basner said, "a number of those in the hospitals narrowly escaped like fate because of the same faulty thinking."
