

OIL PRODUCERS CLAIM VICTORY

Two Independents Rescind Price Reductions After Shut-Down

—OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 17 (AP)—Most content of producers claimed an initial victory in their slating shutdown was against co-terminating price cuts as two independent companies rescinded 20-cent per barrel reductions. They were the Bell Oil and Gas company and the Pacific Petroleum Co., both of Tulsa.

Heads of the major purchasing companies whose price cuts put into effect last week were responsible for the current price war on indication whether they would follow the two companies' lead.

A slight improvement in the Caddo Crude Oil Purchasing company of Shreveport, La., announced a 10-cent reduction in the price of crude in the Shreveport "backyard" field.

Nevertheless, observers expected the stoppage of 60 per cent of the nation's crude production to bring results shortly.

Meanwhile, in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kansas, Nebraska and New Mexico continued to enforce oil field shutdowns holding 2,500,000 barrels of crude in storage.

The Loson Oil refining company challenged in court the right of the Arkansas oil and gas commission to shut down oil fields while Governor Carl E. Bailey sent a detachment of state police to El Dorado to see that no one was shutting down all wells in the state's controlled fields.

The Oklahoma Stripped Well association changed in an open letter to President Henry M. Dutton of the Pure Oil company that present "chaotic conditions" were caused by unrestricted production of oil.

Oil executives at Tulsa said the effect of the shutdowns on gasoline prices probably would not be felt until the nation's motorists for some time. The spot gasoline market is up half a cent.

STRONGHOLD OF OUTLAWS TAMED

Cookson Hills, Hideout of Gangsters, Turned into Vacation Paradise

MARBLE CITY, Okla., Aug. 17 (AP)—The Cookson hills, stronghold of outlaw gangs, are being tamed by the federal government.

Today, when you motor into the hills, you see the state's favorite rendezvous of gangsters from the deer field period to the machine gun era, and a vacationers' paradise and wildlife refuge.

In a picturesque valley which once echoed with the clattering of hoof beats and load of mulepack which signaled another day of the outlaw's life, there are now swimming pools, fishing, and boating.

And in the deeper recesses of the hills, where "Prety Boy" Floyd often hid in safety from the law, wild turkey, deer and prairie chickens roam in great numbers.

Today, the hills are a vacationers' paradise and wildlife refuge. In a picturesque valley which once echoed with the clattering of hoof beats and load of mulepack which signaled another day of the outlaw's life, there are now swimming pools, fishing, and boating.

Everywhere, there is evidence that this area has been tamed completely. Marble City, a nest of ruffians in former years, reports a reform.

The Cookson hills, embracing 100 square miles, sprawl across the country corner of Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri.

They conceal hundreds of hiding places—"Mammoth" scaled caves are plentiful and there are narrow passages where a well-armed desperado might hold a resistant at bay.

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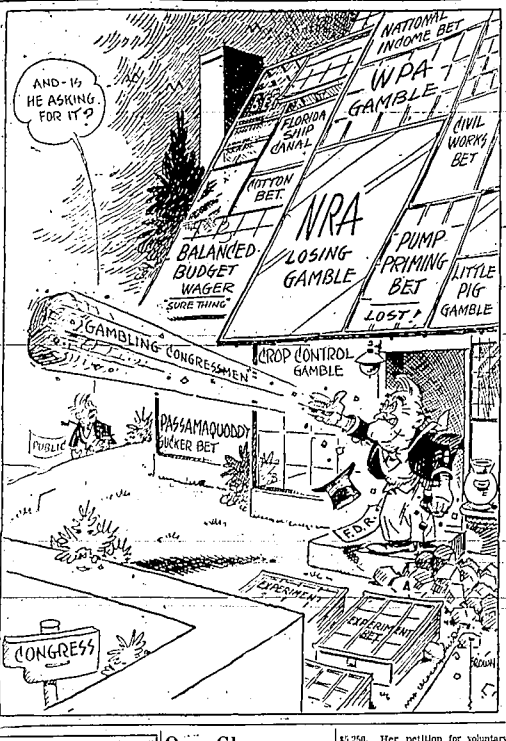

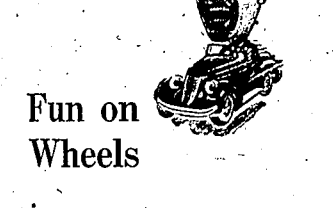

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FOREIGN BONDS TAKE MILLIONS

Protective Council Reports Americans Fleece of Huge Sums

NEW YORK, Aug. 17 (AP)—The foreign bondholders' protective council reported today that foreign governments in the last few years have fleeced the American public of millions of dollars through bond market manipulations.

The manipulations, the council declared, "seem willful, if not planned."

"As described by the council, the usual method of operation is to issue government bonds to American holders on payments to American holders of the bonds to maintain an immediate decline in the values of their securities."

"When the price is low enough, the government sees to it that large quantities of the bonds are purchased on the open market. These bonds are then returned to the country of origin."

"The council stated that this repatriation of bonds largely at the expense of the American investor amounted to as much as \$275,000,000 of currency, a considerable part of this amount being accounted for by the operation of the bonds at the expense of the American investor."

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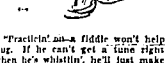
