British Scan, French Spurn Nazis' Terms

Powers Push Military Preparedness Measures Despite 'Eleventh Hour' Stay of Blow

(By The Associated Press.) Europe's outlook for peace darkened early today as Fuchter Hitler announced a sudden cancellation of his great Nazi party congress at Nuremberg, which was to have opened next Saturday.

The move, announced in Berlin shortly before midnight, followed dispatch of the French reply to the fuhrer's peace proposals. France was reported to have told Hitler firmly that she has given her guarantee to Poland and intends to make good.

If Germany wants a peaceful solution, she must negotiate a settlement directly with Poland as an equal power, France was reported to have informed the fuhrer.

Meanwhile Britain delayed replying to the Hitler message, brought to London by airplane Saturday by the British ambassador to Berlin Sir Neville Henderson. Hitler was reported to have demanded a straight "yes" or "no" reply to his proposals.

HITLER'S ACTION DAMPENS HOPES

Fuehrer Calls Off-Nazi Show Without Waiting for English Reply

BERLIN, Aug. 26 (AP)—Adolf Hitler called off his Nazi "party day of peace" tonight without waiting for a British reply to his "eleventh hour" offer of a "minimum demands" on Poland.

The cancellation of the Nazi biennial show which was to have taken place at Nuremberg beginning Sept. 2, dampened faintly rising hopes that Hitler might accept his present difficulties peacefully.

The party's "day of peace," a name chosen by Hitler himself, was to have been held in London on the 27th of the month.

It was called off less than an hour after the British cabinet in London had finished pondering Hitler's "minimum demands," which British Ambassador Sir Neville Henderson had rushed to the English capital by airplane.

Demands Excessive The impression here was that through his diplomatic organization Hitler had heard that the British cabinet would indicate that it would accept his "minimum demands" on Poland for further consideration.

RUSSIA REPORTS SOVIET GERMAN PACT

MOSCOW, Aug. 26 (AP)—Soviet War Commissar Kliment Voroshiloff declared tonight that Russia had concluded its non-aggression pact with Germany "among other reasons" because the Russian-British-French military staff talks had reached a deadlock in view of insuperable differences.

IDAHO'S MEDICOS TEST GROUP PLAN

State Association Authorizes Socialized Medicine Experiment

BOISE, Aug. 26 (AP)—Idaho physicians embarked today on an experiment in socialized medicine.

The Idaho medical association, at the concluding day's session of its 74th annual four-day convention, voted to permit local medical societies to enter into an agreement with any voluntary group to provide for medical care at a cost to be determined in advance.

Physicians asserted the action was the first of its kind to be taken by any state medical association in the Pacific northwest.

Oppose Federal Law

Idaho opponents opposed, however, enactment of legislation, commonly known as the "Social Security Act of 1933," which they said in a resolution was "highly unsatisfactory" to the medical profession and which would "lower the standard of medical care."

"The action dealing with socialized medicine was adopted on an experimental basis," said Dr. Paul Ellis of Wallace, chairman of the resolution committee.

"No one knows how it is going to work but we are trying to do some of the things that other states have encountered."

"Each local society that arranges for group medical care would appoint an auditing committee of five doctors which would supervise the setting up of the program and would be responsible to the state association."

Dr. Ellis explained that fees to be charged and type of service to be rendered would be determined by local associations and might vary over the state.

First Testing Group

The upper Snake river region societies of the state are the most active in securing adoption of the resolution, Dr. Ellis said, and may be the scene of the first test of the new program.

"There are nine local medical societies of the state which most active might be entered into by all of them if there is demand for the service," Dr. Ellis explained, adding:

"In some counties there appears to be no particular need for such a program while other counties have been very incident that such a program be undertaken."

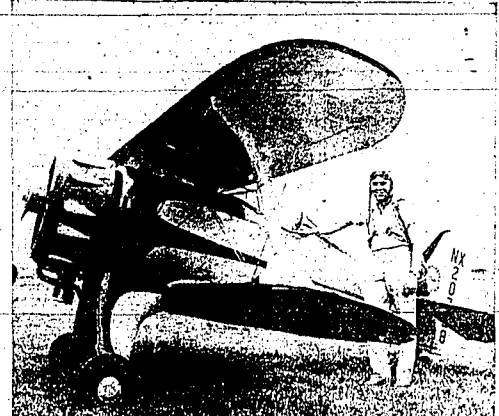

AIRPLANES HUNT SNEEZE WEEDS

Scientists Conduct Thorough Nationwide Study of Hay Fever, Asthma

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Scientists in airplanes soon will start the first thorough nationwide study of the country's sneeze weeds.

In flights over 30,000 miles of air lanes across the United States and areas both oceanic, they will gather air samples for a system's check-up on the pollen grains which cause hay fever and some kinds of asthma.

The study, which will extend all the way from the Gulf of Mexico to Alaska, across the Atlantic to Europe and across the Pacific to China, is an effort to find how much pollen is carried in the air, how high it is lifted by wind currents and how far it can travel.

O. C. Durham, chief botanist of the Abbott Laboratories, Chicago, is in charge of the study. He plans to fly about 10,000 miles of commercial air lanes during the coming month to expose microfilm slides covered with oil in the air at various altitudes to collect pollen and germs. His airplane act will be a miniature laboratory equipped with a radio and microphone to make immediate examinations of the sample collected.

The method is one used by Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh on their flight across the North Atlantic in 1927. A coated slide or dish is put out into the airstream on a special machine which is exposed for five minutes, pulled back and sent to the laboratory.

Durham has furnished such "pollen traps" to the pilots of United Air Lines, Pennsylvania Central and Pan American Airways and numerous U. S. weather bureau stations for exposures which will supplement his own.

With this intensive study he expects to determine for the first time the exact location of the "sneeze areas" of the country, the distribution of various kinds of pollen, and the number and kinds of pollen in the air during the hay fever season.

The study is of tremendous interest to physicians treating hay fever patients, he explained. "After they determine by skin tests the irritating pollen from which a patient suffers and learn the exact time of year, as well as the total amount of pollen which can be expected, it is often possible to 'desensitize' a patient. This is done by administering gradually increasing doses of the pollen to which the patient is allergic."

WEALTHY SPEED PILOT IN BURLEY AIR SHOW

One of the featured performers on the Tex Rankin air show tonight is A. P. "Putt" Humphries who specializes in speed, and queer ideas which he puts into effect with a midsize, plane of his own specifications built in Denver. The group will appear in the all-Idaho air show at the Burley airport Sept. 18 and 19.

The little five pocket edition of the P-12 pirated plane is 15 feet long and has a wing spread of 19 feet. The ship which is capable of speeds in excess of 300 miles per hour lands at a speed of 35 miles and is about the fastest thing in the whole show.

Humphries gives several speed dashes during the afternoon in the little ship, and clinches his afternoon performance with a spectacular demonstration of speed and control by dashing across the airport at 300 miles per hour to pick up a handkerchief out of the ground with the wing tip of his plane.

On his second appearance in the afternoon Humphries gives a remarkable exhibition of stunts—acrobatics in a high powered Ryan monoplane, performing some very difficult maneuvers.

Prince Umberto No Longer Youngster Full of Pranks

ROSE Correspondent of The Associated Press — Crown Prince Umberto, who stands to succeed his father as king of Italy and Albania and emperor of Ethiopia, is becoming more and more serious in his duties as a prince of the house of Savoia.

There is not much room in the Fascist regime for demonstrations of princely interest in social conditions. On occasion, however, Umberto has displayed the good fellow with princely earnestness and his wife made a hit with Italians as a nurse during the conquest of the empire.

The foreign anti-Fascist propaganda mill has used him frequently. Rumors that he is "in bad" with Mussolini, that he is not to succeed to the throne, that he is to be exiled to Belgium and similar stories break out periodically. He ignores them and goes on showing himself at Fascist and anti-Fascist affairs. The prince and his father both show an understandable caution about committing the ruling house too deeply in internal politics.

But those who pass on glibly such rumors as that Umberto is to be exiled overlook that such an event probably would shock Italians infinitely more than Lindbergh's departure from the United States startled Americans.

The king-emperor has little to say in Fascist politics but he is a real background force in Italy, where the army high command is viewed with distrust by the Fascist government. Monarchist in Italy means a supporter of the house of Savoia.

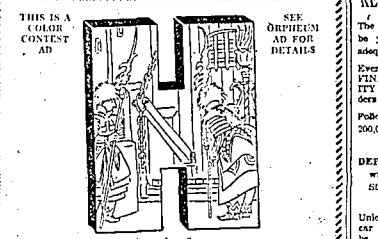

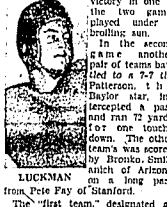
