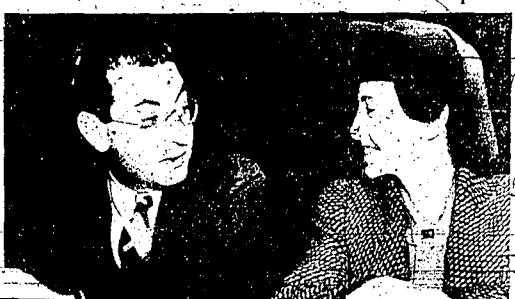

ATTACK RENEWED ON TRADE PACTS

Nevadan Claims Pledge Given to Exempt Coal, Copper, Oil, Lumber

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Senator McCarran (D., Nev.) today in the senate today to exempt coal, copper, oil and lumber from the future operations of the trade agreement program, under which the United States lowers tariffs and other trade barriers in return for concessions from other nations.

McCarran offered his exemption proposal in the form of an amendment to the pending legislation to extend the trade program three years.

He contended that advocates of the program had given assurances in 1934 that the pact would not affect commodities covered by important excise taxes (coal, copper, oil and lumber), and asserted that the original bill never would have been enacted otherwise.

Senator Clark (D., Mo.) declared that the purpose of the McCarran amendment was to make the four products exempt from the pact if they were exempted there was no reason why other products should not be dealt with similarly. As the debate wore on Chairman Harrison (D., Miss.) of the Finance Committee, in charge of the measure, obtained unanimous consent to limit the speeches on the amendment tomorrow to one hour and a vote on it by midnight. A vote on the bill as a whole, however, probably will not be reached until the end of the week.

It is anticipated that all yards and alleys will have had their spring cleaning by the end of the week.



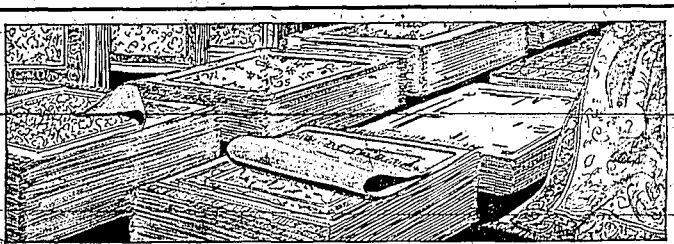

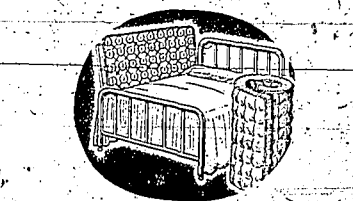

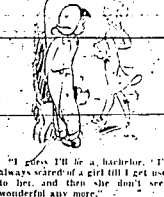
