Morris Posner, New Witness in Murder Trial, Asserts His Belief in Innocence Changed

A Utah jeweler testified in district court in Twin Falls yesterday that Duncen M. Johnston was not the murderer of George L. Olson, tried unsuccessfully about July 1, 1938.

The witness was Morris Posner of Salt Lake City, Olson's home town.

Johnston, former two-term mayor of Twin Falls, stands accused of shooting Olson to death with a .25-caliber semi-automatic pistol.

Jaycee Park Project Crew Goes to Work

Extensive Improvement Program Receives Final 'Go Ahead' Signal

Start of an extensive WPA project for development of the Jaycee park in Twin Falls receiving its "go ahead" signal yesterday with authorization of an amendment to the city plan by the Junior Chamber of Commerce for a 30-foot stretch to be used as a road along the south side of the park.

At work today will be 30 WPA employees, some have formerly been engaged on the Spokane (Ida) project. The improvement program will be carried out under the original contract made with the city.

Immediate activities will center on grading and seeding to 2000 of a major portion of the park. A parking area will be constructed on the south side of the baseball field and a sidewalk constructed from local stone to the baseball park.

Further developments are anticipated for the summer, depending upon extent to which WPA funds can be matched by the city. 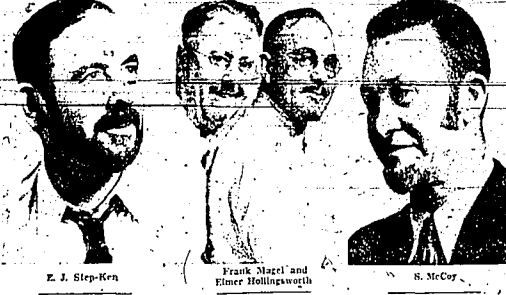

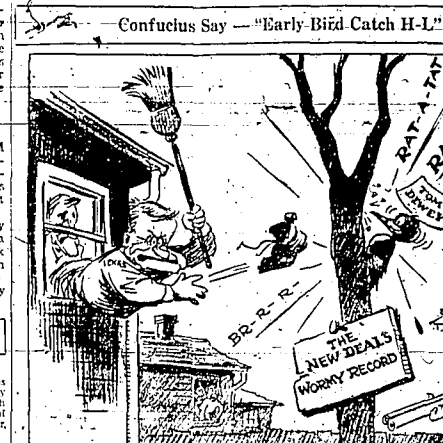

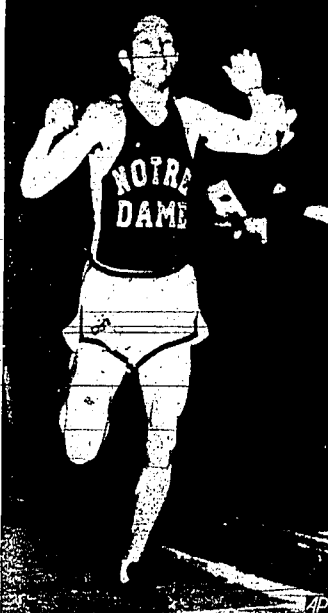
