

# Murder Charged Former Mayor on Witness Stand

## Duncan Johnston, on Trial for Life, Tells Own Story; Prepares for Cross-Examination

In a district courtroom packed with spectators Duncan M. Johnston, former Twin Falls mayor, who is accused of murdering a Salt Lake City jewelry salesman, took the witness stand at 4:25 p.m. yesterday in defense of his own life.

He had little more than started his narration when Judge James Porter recessed court at 5:30 p.m. Johnston will resume the stand, confronted with the prospect of having to undergo a blistering cross-examination at the hands of the county attorney, Edward W. Beckwith, before the day ends.

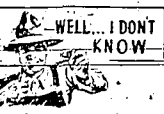

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—(Blue-eyed, 11-year-old) Child Davis started to tell her story yesterday...

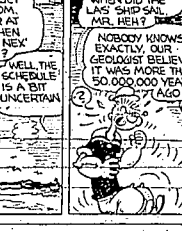
