

JOHNSTON FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

Verdict of Jury Fixes Penalty at Life in Prison

12 Businessmen and Farmers Convicted Former Mayor of More Than Three Hours After Hearing Case

A jury of 12 businessmen and farmers brought in a verdict at 6 o'clock last evening, finding Duncan M. Johnston guilty of the murder of George L. Olson, Salt Lake City jewelry salesman.

DRAMATIC SCENE UNFOLDS AT TRIAL

Convicted of Murder, Former Mayor Moved Head as if in Denial

Duncan M. Johnston mechanically moved his head from side to side and passed his right hand over his eyes early last evening in the district court when he was found guilty of the murder of George L. Olson, Salt Lake City jewelry salesman, by a jury of 12 businessmen and farmers.

Johnston accepted the verdict without a word, but he was pale with emotion.

Defense attorneys indicated they probably would appeal.

The jury's only other alternative in finding the defendant guilty of first degree murder was to recommend death on the gallows.

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FOR PROTECTS SCANDINAVIAN AMERICAN SHIPS IN U.S.

Orders Block Confiscation of Wealth by Germany and Ban-American Vessels From New-Combat Zone

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON, April 10.—President Roosevelt, in sweeping orders, today blocked German confiscation of Danish and Norwegian wealth in this country—banned American ships from the new war zone.

In an unprecedented executive order, he prohibited, except after approval of the War Relocation Authority, the removal of any money, or other wealth, from this country, belonging to the governments or citizens of Denmark and Norway.

By this step he removed any doubt about the attitude of this government toward a repetition of the steps by which Germany seized all the assets of the Danes and Norwegians available when she occupied Austria, Czechoslovakia and Poland.

German seizure of some of these assets in Europe but in this country, it was learned for the first time, the treasury made financial arrangements with American banks to double-check the legality of the seizure.

One official said formal action, rather than informal, was taken in the case of Norway and Denmark, because the latter was believed to have been fully effective in these cases.

He said no one knew just how much money was tied up by the order, but that the first step taken under it was to deposit that all holders of Danish or Norwegian assets in this country report it to the treasury for an accounting.

Extensive combat zone, the president's line with the neutrals acts intention to keep Americans out of the danger zones, a separate presidential proclamation prohibited to the American ships and passengers.

It also bans ships now cannot touch Europe at any port from a point in Spain on the south to another point on the north, between the northern boundary of the zone stopped at about Bergen, Norway, thus, all ships from the zone to the United States and Finland and a part of Russia are forbidden, under penalty of a fine of \$20,000 or imprisonment for one year.

The "stop order" on Scandinavian ships was an amendment of the "trading with the enemy" act of 1917.

What and what policy would guide the Treasury in giving permission for the withdrawal of Scandinavian assets from this country, was not clear.

For diplomatic reasons, officials said, the move was directed at Germany, but they left no doubt on this point.

NAZI THRUST IN BALKANS LOOMS

British and French Officials Admit Army Far From Ready

Agriculture Department Forecasts Smallest Crop Since 1933

WASHINGTON, April 10.—With an estimated 22 per cent of the winter wheat crop in the United States now in the hands of drought, the Agriculture department announced today that the winter wheat crop for 1940 will be the smallest since 1933.

Based on conditions prevailing April 10, the estimate is that 27,000,000 bushels of winter wheat will be produced in the United States this year, compared with 42,000,000 bushels in 1933.

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# Third Termers and Dewey Camp Jubilant

## Election Results in Illinois and Nebraska Deemed Significant

(By The Associated Press)  
 WASHINGTON, April 10.—Thomas E. Dewey's second victory in the middle west raised the hopes of his supporters to a new peak today and led many politicians to believe that he was well on the lead for the Republican presidential nomination.

At the same time, another triumph for President Roosevelt, this time a 6-to-1 victory over Vice President Garner in Illinois, strengthened a widespread belief that the chief executive has but to say the word to obtain a third-term nomination.

The Democratic National committee contended that the Illinois vote "completely destroys the myth of a Republican trend in this year's presidential election." Mr. Roosevelt and Vice-President Garner polled 61.6 per cent of the total vote cast, it said, calling that a figure of "unparalleled proportions."

Garner, hearing Senator Vandenberg of Michigan by two to one in Wisconsin last week, Dewey represented that performance in the state on Tuesday, although by a lower margin. The young new York district attorney polled 37.5 per cent in Wisconsin, 28.37, with 1,573 of Nebraska's 2023 precincts reported.

But while Dewey's victories put him well in front, Washington politicians believe he still has many hurdles to surmount. For one thing, he has yet to come up against Senator Felt of Ohio, or any Republican aspirant other than Vandenberg.

In addition, politicians generally regard it as dangerous for a candidate to be far ahead too early in the campaign. While it concentrates public attention upon him, it also invites one of the familiar "stop" movements with all rivals combined against him. In the opinion of some, the situation already has settled down to a "stop Dewey" contest.

Powerful Organization  
 In Illinois, President Roosevelt beat Garner 92,773 to 149,738 with 60.4 of 823 precinct counties. That many third termers thought, clinched the question for them and made it exceedingly difficult for the president to refuse to be drafted.

The Committee nevertheless found consolation in the situation. E. B. Germany and Clara Driscoll, joint leaders of the Garner campaign, said "our regular contacts have been expected" since Garner had "no organized support" and was opposed by "the most powerful political organization in the nation," the Kelly-Nash-Horner machine.

Over 400 persons in this state have died of cancer in the last year by an earthquake, by fire or by such disease as measles or typhoid fever, there would have been an immediate emergency campaign for relief. Every member of the state would have been urged to give.

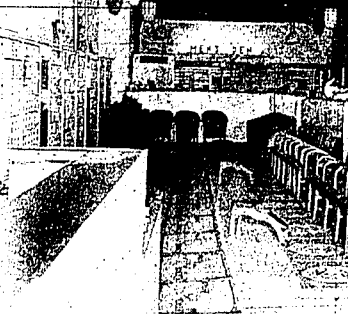

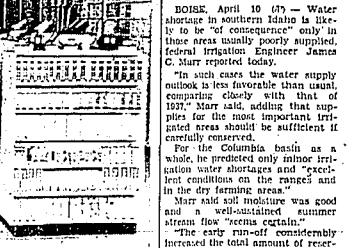

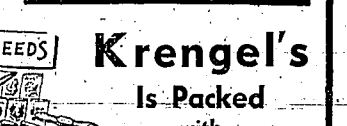
