SOLOM FIGHTS FOR TRANSFER OF AGENCIES

Senator McCarran Introduces Legislation to Kill Two Reorganization Plans Submitted by Roosevelt

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 11.—Aroused because President Roosevelt has decided to reorganize agencies regarding aviation, Senator McCarran (D-Nev) today proposed legislation to kill the two most recent government reorganization plans submitted to Congress by the chief executive.

McCarran said the plan would "destroy the effectiveness" of the civil aeronautics authority which he helped to create, and would "make a hodge-podge of all aeronautic regulation."

Would Retain Power Under today's plan, the CAA, now an independent agency, would be put into the structure of the commerce department, except that it would retain its present status as an independent agency.

Weather Bureau Transfer The reorganization plan, which Mr. Roosevelt estimated would save \$100 annually, would transfer the weather bureau from the agriculture to the commerce department.

Transfer of the duties of the food and drug administration from the agriculture to the federal security administration.

Transfer to the labor department of the duties of the treasury and interior departments to enforce minimum wages in federal construction contracts.

Transfer from the agriculture to the department of the interior of the conservation functions carried out on lands under jurisdiction of the federal department.

Transfer from the justice to the treasury department of the authority to approve companies in cases arising under the federal alcohol administration act.

FIVE ARRESTED IN NARCOTICS RAIDS

Boise and Caldwell Officers Uncover Supplies of Opium, Marihuana

BOISE, April 11.—Boise and Caldwell authorities, striking three times within a week, revealed today they had uncovered supplies of both opium and marihuana with a total value of around \$3,000 and had arrested five men.

Latest arrests was that of Van Stron, 23, former near Melba, who was charged with illegal possession of marihuana.

Willard Harris, Cascon county deputy sheriff, said he had seized at least two pounds of the drug. The federal tax on it is \$100 an ounce.

U. S. Assists Americans in Scandinavia

3,371 Offered Full Aid of State Department in Fleeing New Theater of Europe's Spreading War

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 11.—The 3,371 Americans in Scandinavia who were offered tonight the full assistance of the state department in fleeing that area, which is rapidly becoming the main theater of the European war.

The department sent instructions to United States diplomats there that Americans who wished to leave should proceed via Germany to Great Britain for embarkation on American vessels.

Under the present order, such assets, whether in money, credit or otherwise, may not be exported without a license issued by the state department.

Early in the day, the department received word from the location at Oslo, Norway, that the area was occupied by the Germans, that all American citizens were well, so far as was known.

Polish Government Mrs. Helen Harrison, the American minister, who followed the Norwegian government in its flight from Oslo, and Hamar, reported by telephone via Stockholm that she would continue to act as the American minister.

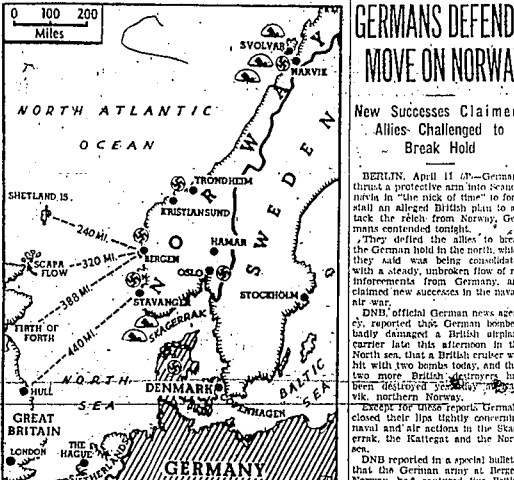

Game Experts Trail Vanishing 'Bighorns' in Idaho

Wildlife Researchers Study Disappearance Of Mountain Sheep

Game Management Specialists Hope to Determine Cause of Decrease; Many Theories Advanced

SALMON, Idaho April 11 (AP)—The passenger pigeon and the heath hen are gone. The buffalo is a zoo specimen. Is the massive horned mountain sheep next on civilization's chopping block?

Not while wildlife experts of western United States still have an idea left.

In three states—Wyoming, Colorado and Idaho—and in others through cooperation of the national park service and the forest service, game management specialists are studying every phase of the "bighorn" life—the food habits, the animals and parasites that prey upon it, the records of poachers and licensed hunters.

It's about 100,000. The forest service's estimate of mountain sheep in 1921 was about 100,000. In 1939 that figure had dropped to 8,000 with the decrease still going on. Nobody knows exactly why.

Many Theories Advanced
Under the Pittman-Robertson act, which aids states by supplying matching funds for restoration and conservation of wildlife, Idaho, Wyoming and Colorado have launched detailed studies of the sheep in their natural habitat—the most inaccessible, rugged terrain in America.

Trained observers with field glasses and telescopic cameras followed the scattered bands wherever they go, up steep rock ledges and down shale slopes, analyzing the food, inspecting their habits, examining carcasses.

In Idaho, Marshall Gaultin and Gordon Ellis, both college-trained game management specialists, have embarked on a project that may take a year or five. The two, who are employed by the Idaho fish and game department, live a spartan existence 18 miles from the nearest road.

Their tests of skill and agility in mountain climbing put a "bighorn" under to shame.

The animals' condition, a biologist says, is "fairly good." But to cover, have made it a prime purpose of the study to determine when the game management men find out why the sheep is decreasing when the ratio starts to drop, then, perhaps, the closed seasons will be opened and bighorn heads again will adorn mantels.

Plan Best Scouting Job
Before they finish, the whole, up-to-date wilderness of rivers and mountains will be scoured for mountain sheep. Idaho's "river of no return," the main Salmon river, will be included. The sheep aren't found along the streams, however. They come down

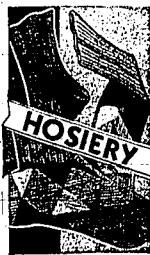
