

Johnston Again Carries Case to Supreme Court

Ex-Mayor, Twice Convicted of Murder, Receives Sentence, But Remains in County Jail

Twice convicted of a murder charge, a former Twin Falls mayor and jeweler, Duncan M. Johnston, was again sentenced in district court in Twin Falls yesterday to life imprisonment for first degree murder in 1938 of George J. Olson, Salt Lake City jewelry salesman and father of three children.

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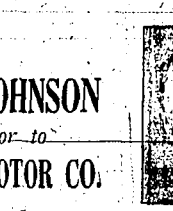

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# CLARK'S EYE ON GOVERNOR CHAIR

### Idaho Falls Mayor's Talk at Lewiston Deemed Significant

LEWISTON, Idaho, April 12 (AP)—Silver-haired Chase A. Clark, mayor of Idaho Falls and oft-mentioned candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, declared here tonight:

"I can think of no greater ambition for any man who lives in this state than the opportunity to serve as governor and make it his personal task to cut useless extravagance and take the outrageous tax burden off the homes of our state business of Idaho."

Mayor Clark did just say he was a candidate, but his remarks at a Jefferson day banquet prompted some to predict he would enter the race.

"Idaho Democrats have a real duty to perform in retaining our state on a cash basis," he said in a prepared address.

"The Republicans have increased the state individual income more than 100 per cent and the tax levy 125 per cent."

"Acceding present state taxation under the O.P.P. regime, the speaker declared:

"The income and from various sources were told that the purpose of the income tax is to 'fill the' tax. # DEWEY OPPONENT GETS SIDETRACK

### New York Committee Votes to Name Successor to Simpson

ALBANY, N. Y., April 12 (AP)—A New York Republican schism, developing from a filiprity bias antagonism to the presidential candidacy of Thomas E. Dewey, pushed a harassed party leadership today into a national "sidetrack" campaign for the state's favorite son. Hostility to the Manhattan prosecutor flared yesterday when the 69-state committee voted, 200 to 69, in favor of selecting a successor before expiration of his term.

The move, climaxing elevation of Edwin F. Jacek of Buffalo, a Dewey campaign leader, to the state committee's leadership, confronted the party chiefs with fears that the New York party split over the national commissioner may cast a "double" on the stability of Dewey's candidacy in other states.

E. Simpson, also New York county chairman, may draw his 23 home delegates into a national convention battle against Dewey.

A planned rejection of a Simpson successor prior to the June national meeting, contrary to precedent, could raise an embarrassing question of validity from the pro-Dewey Republican group which includes supporters of Frank Gannett, Rochester publisher, for the nomination.

POCATELLO, April 12 (AP)—Mrs. Frances Hardy, 34, charged with slaying her husband, Charles E. Hardy, 32, in their home April 2, was released today after a week and a half in jail. She was arrested the first time she was arrested a week ago after \$1000 bond was posted for her appearance in court. Judge of the Peace William Hinkley heard arguments by defense and prosecution on the question of bail this morning.

Bainnook county Prosecutor C. M. Jeffrey did not oppose the motion. Mrs. Hardy was held to face trial in fifth district court on a charge of murder at the close of a two-day preliminary hearing in the police court chambers yesterday afternoon.

Throughout the hearing, defense offered an alibi. Mrs. Hardy failed to take the stand although she testified at a recessed hearing April 6. The suspect jury turned a unanimous verdict declaring Hardy's death caused by gunshot wound inflicted by "person or persons unknown."

Hardy was treasurer for the Pocatello school of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. A preliminary trial of his body was ordered everything to be in order, the prosecutor said.

# FOOD STAMPS FOR IDAHO APPROVED

### Plan for Relief Distribution Extended to Six Counties

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—Secretary Wallace today approved extension of the government's food stamp plan to six counties in north Idaho.

Officials said 4,355 public assistance households with 13,449 persons in Blaine, Boundary, Kootenai, Latah, Shoshone and Benewah counties will benefit.

Persons on relief who purchase blue stamps receive an equal amount of orange stamps which are used to buy surplus foods.

Jonathan Gatti, regional director of the Federal surplus commodities corporation, said extension of the plan to Idaho would remove considerable food from the glutted market.

# EMPLOYMENT IN IDAHO INCREASES

## Service Director Reports Upswing in Placements of Workers

BOISE, April 13 (AP)—Workers placed in private employment through the facilities of the Idaho state employment service today totaled 1,538 in March, 1930, S. D. Hayes, state director of the service, reported today.

March placements increased 39 per cent over the same month a year ago and private placements for the first quarter of 1930 totaled 4,272, increased 42 per cent over the first quarter of 1929, when 2,911 placements were effected, Hayes said.

New applications of unemployed workers remained about the same, he said, with a total of 10,787 for the first quarter of 1930 as compared to 6,122 for the same period in 1929. The active file has increased from 12,503 on March 31, 1929 to 14,000 on March 31, 1930.

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—President Hoover scoffed yesterday at a charge that his proposed aviation regulation agencies would imperil air safety.

A short time later Senator McCarran (D., Nev.), critic of the plan, snapped back with the statement that they would elicit a return to a system which brought disaster over disaster to commercial aviation.

The reorganization plan would put both the Federal Aviation Commission and the Federal Bureau of Investigation under the Commerce Department, but the president said that the five-man civil aeronautics board would perform its rule-making, administrative and enforcement functions independently. The air safety board would be established and its duties, investigation and other duties would be transferred to the civil aeronautics board.

"Mr. Roosevelt said today that every effort to make air transportation safe and efficient is being made," Hoover said, adding that existing administrative machinery would remain intact.

But if they brought pardonable pride to their original owner, they have served him in a better way.

Baker hung up his first transcontinental automobile record in 1916. He also won open Buick races over 74 miles stretch between San Diego and New York in 11 days, 7 hours and 30 minutes.

He drove in only one 500-mile trial day race since he was 1922. Data represent the biggest hazard to present-day motorists, in Baker's opinion. He explains that a "hilo" car is a bigger hazard than the most moderate that know how to use their brakes.

### IDAHO'S WATER OUTLOOK BRIGHT

#### Weather Bureau Reports Precipitation Above State's Normal

BOISE, April 13 (AP)—Irrigation water prospects—generally speaking—appear bright for 1940-1941.

H. O. Carter, federal weather bureau meteorologist for Idaho, reported today that total precipitation for the state from Oct. 1, 1939, to March 31, 1940, was 102 per cent of normal, compared with 98 per cent of normal between Oct. 1, 1939, and March 31, 1939.

The figures by sections of the state for the 1939-1940 period were reported as:

southwestern division, 117 and 84 per cent; southeastern division, 103 and 129 per cent.

Snow depths over the elevated regions of Idaho last April were "mostly less than a year previous, except at scattered points of the Lost Wood and Salmon river drainages."

H. O. Carter, federal meteorologist, reported that for the past year the total snow pack in Idaho was mostly well packed and quite solid, with good water content, being mostly above normal.

"The snow pack under the snow is mostly well saturated, except locally at high elevations of the Wood and Lost Wood drainage areas."

"Snow is out of the ground quite generally, except at some higher elevations of the Wood river drainage area."

Warm weather is melting snow rapidly.
