ATTEMPT TO BOOST FLOOD FUNDS FAILS

Senate's Economy Advocates Reject Demands for Increase; Taft Opposes 'Pork Barrel Proposition'

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Renewing its sporadic economy efforts, the senate rejected today demands for a \$30,000,000 increase in flood control funds and then gave final approval to the \$223,836,517 appropriation for non-military functions of the war department.

Although the bill carried \$20,167,215 more than the hour-a-day total and \$2,242,017 more than President Roosevelt's budget estimate, economy advocates were gleeful that they had turned back by a 29 to 31 vote—the effort to tack on the additional flood control money.

Defeat of that proposal left sponsors of increased waterway spending to drop an amendment to add \$25,000,000 for rivers and harbors projects.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), one of those opposing the increased flood control allotment, told the senate that was a "pork barrel proposition" and that Senator Thomas (D-Ore.), sponsor of the amendment, had sent him a list of Ohio projects which would benefit from the increase.

That turned me against the amendment as much as anything could," Taft continued. "Of course this is a desirable feature, but the question is, 'Where are we going to get the money?'"

He finally approved, the non-military appropriation carried \$700,000 for general flood-control projects and \$20,000,000 for river and harbor projects. The latter projects were rejected in the house.

Deficit Nearing \$3,000,000,000

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The federal deficit, reported at \$500,000,000 today with 2 1/2 months of the fiscal year yet to go, has reached a record, says a \$15,000,000 appropriation for the start of work on a new set of Panama Canal locks and a \$20,000,000 authorization for the war department to enter contracts for building on the project.

The latter proposals were rejected in the house.

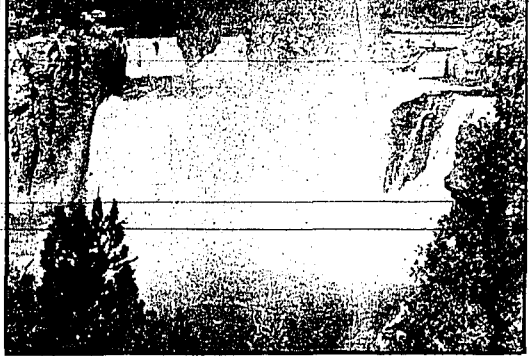

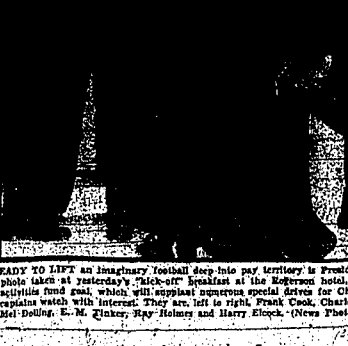

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PERIL SEEN IN NORWAY BATTLE

U.S. Military Authority Takes Gloomy View of Allies' Position

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—An estimate that the German army has been able to transport probably 65,000 troops into southern Norway is being taken into account today by military officials.

This estimate was coupled with a cautious prediction that the invaders plan to increase this force to 100,000 unless the pressure of allied land, naval and air power should demand even more reinforcements.

On the basis of late war substantiated information, conflicting in some particulars with reports from belligerent sources, informed military men took a gloomy view of the unfolding situation facing the allies as a result of their foe's coup.

In "Vistula Trap" and "The Vistula Trap" an outstanding authority expressed belief that the British and French had been forced into a virtual trap from which they could fight their way only at a grave disadvantage.

One law of the trap was represented as the popular demand in England for retaliatory action and the necessity to maintain allied prestige for the sake of neutrals.

The line of supply for allied expeditionary forces, it was noted, is exposed now to air attacks from Nazi bombers which can be accompanied by protecting pursuit planes from nearby bases on the Norwegian coast.

To cope with them, the allies possess few fighting planes of sufficient long range to accompany transports and supply ships across the North sea, military calculations indicated.

Germany favored every military factor was adjusted to favor the Germans, including the central position, control of railways, radiating from Oslo, and the superior and better protected route for supplies and reinforcements from Germany and Denmark.

The allied attack on the far northern line or port of Narvik was viewed as an isolated action, with little effect on the ultimate decision on more important southern Norway.

The Nazi troops were transported despite the British efforts to annihilate in the paths of transport through the Kattegat and Skagerrak and the British naval raids at the start of the invasion.

Latest authoritative advice prompted official conclusions that only submarines took part in the raids, with mining operations, and that British surface vessels have ventured even along the southern coast of Norway at any time.

BALTIC KEY TO SCANDIA'S FATE

Open Sea Route to Norway Seen as Essential for German Success

The first phase of the battle of Norway, which may prove to be the turning point of the whole European war, ends with hopes seemingly dimly divided.

Still sketchy German forces, moving with dispatch speed, have seized control of strategic rail routes in southern and central Norway to block expected allied counterattacks there. But their foes are battering at the Narvik gateway to Scandinavia from the coast, which are of vital consequence to Germany, and are grimly trying to force their way in from Germany.

Of far greater immediate consequence is what is happening in the other waters of the North sea, where the German fleet of Admiral Raeder, with its heavy cruisers, is attacking the British fleet of Admiral Tovey, which is trying to force its way into the Narvik gateway.

A substantial part of the German fleet must necessarily be held in such duties as Oslo and in more confined districts for parition and other duty. This there is room for a "blockade" situation, sufficient to overcome the swiftness of the British fleet by speed of movement and surprise, but far short of what Germany must master to meet any major allied counter attack.

If that is true, it is the operation of British submarines and lighter craft endeavoring to block the sea route from Germany to Norway into which the development of the battle in Norway depends.

Seizure of that route would enable Germany to move about Sweden, to land on the Baltic up-land in Norway, sufficiently large and well equipped to meet an allied counter attack of major size.

Failure of the effort to block the Kattegat against German steam and supply ships might well cause London and Paris to think twice before launching a major landing operation in southern Norway despite Norwegian pleas for quick help.

Hour by hour as merger and conflicting reports of the outcome of naval actions in the Skagerrak and Kattegat come in, it seems increasingly clear that the strategy key to the future not only of Norway but of Sweden is there. It is in that area that the British navy and the German fleet are still engaged in the battle, neither the scope nor the crucial fighting ground of the battle of Norway can well be foreseen.

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Heredity Researchers Report Finding 'Stereopticon' Twins

WASHINGTON, April 17 (AP)—A pair of "stereopticon" twins, so named because they are nearly identical after having been separated for 20 years that only an expert can tell them apart, were reported today in the Journal of Heredity, publication of the American Genetic Association.

The girls, identified only as "Lola and Louise," are students at Baylor University, Waco, Tex. Although they were separated eight days after birth, due to the death of their mother, they have lived apart, their mother and her relatives, their voice tones, and even the pitches of their laughs match precisely.

They are good-looking and definitely glamorous and look so much alike that when a pencil is held vertically in front of their picture and an inch away from it a stereoptical or third dimension effect of depth, results. Only their palm and finger prints vary, and those only slightly.

Dr. J. C. Gardner of Baylor and Dr. H. H. Newman of the University of Chicago, who reported their study of the twins, declared that in their opinion, when a question was asked, they almost invariably answered in unison, using almost the same words in the same tone of voice.

They were born July 11, 1920, and since July 19 of that year Lola has lived principally in large cities where her father father worked as a certified public accountant. Louise has lived with the family of her uncle, principally in McGraw, a small town in Texas.

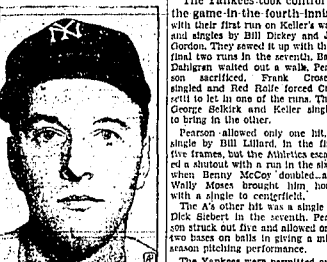

RAYNER SCORES DRUNKEN DRIVER

Idaho Law Enforcement Commissioner Points to Death Toll

BOISE, April 17.—Harry M. Rayner, Idaho commissioner of law enforcement, reported today that 1940 traffic deaths in Idaho up to April 10 totaled 26, compared with 33 during the like period of 1939.

He computed the reduction at 21 per cent.

"The majority of fatal motor vehicle accidents are divided between the drinking driver and the 'rookback,' said Rayner.

"It is difficult to determine the extent to which alcohol influences driving, but it is known to be a serious element."

"Lack of courtesy, disregard of rights of others, rebellion against restraint, recklessness—these are shining lights in the make up of the rookback, and are recognized as primary cause in many tragedies of the road."

"Our war on the drinking driver continues with increased vigour. Recklessness for use in trucks or buildings, as well as recklessness on the highway, are being eliminated by the California department."

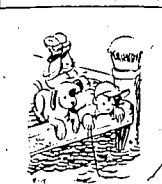

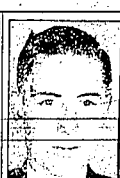

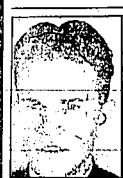
