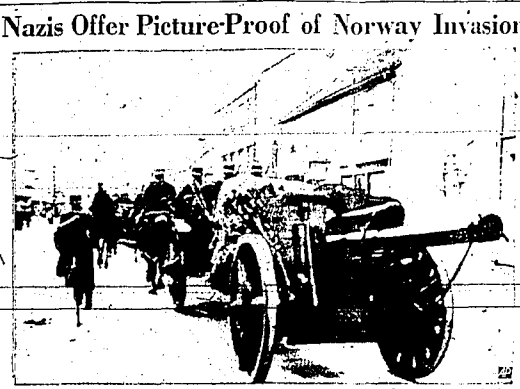

THE GERMAN rear-approved caption on this picture raised from Berlin to New York said it showed German light artillery passing an unidentified Norwegian town. No other information was included.

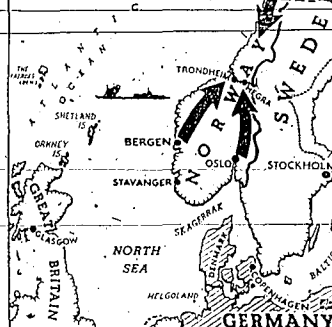

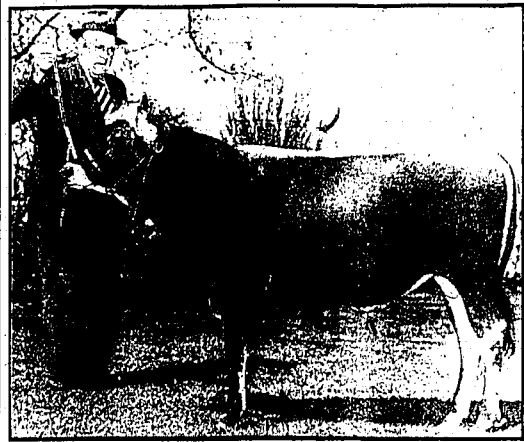

First part of the program was cast in 1890, with Mrs. J. R. Neilson as chairman of the group presenting the state with its history, a collection of such songs as "After the Hunt," "Sisters of New York," and "In the Good Old Summer," accompanied by Mrs. Wesley Brown on her guitar.

SPUR SUGGESTED FOR JOB MAKING

Governmental 'Rewards' for Employers Advanced at Hearing

WASHINGTON, April 10.—A youthful CIO leader and chairman of the majority committee of the House advanced governmental "rewards" for industry and business as a possible means of solving the puzzle of millions of unemployed workers.

James B. Casey, 28-year-old secretary of the Congress of Industrial Organizations and president of one of its biggest unions, said the federal government should encourage and reward industrial leaders when they "take steps in the right direction" to prevent displacement of workers in industries.

Tax incentives

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), chairman of the governmental group now studying the relation between unemployment and technological advances, suggested "incentives" with federal tax reductions for industries and employers who effect unemployment.

"If business has been able to increase production and profits by reducing prices, why would it be a good thing for government to reduce taxes to promote employment?" he asked.

He cited the case of the automobile industry, where the government has been able to reduce taxes on the industry because of its increased production.

Casey, president since 1935 of the United Electrical, Radio and Machine workers with more than 200,000 members now under contract, said the unemployment problem in this country resulted from a "widespread purchasing power, not the ability to produce efficiently."

He said the comparatively new radio industry, in which his union is strongly organized, was typical of technological advances, with its ability to produce the "same amount of radio as in 1922, with only half the number of employees."

Asserting that the federal government had remained "silent and motionless in regard to the solution of the problem," Casey repeated suggestions of other CIO leaders for a general conference on unemployment to include representatives from government, industry, finance, agriculture and labor.

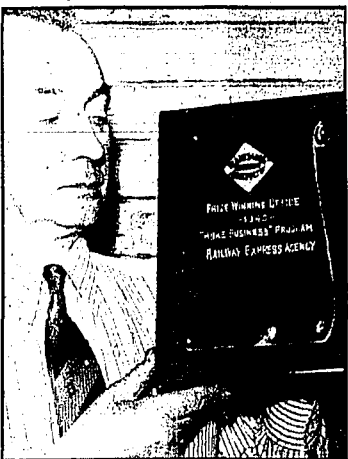

DWORSHAK SCANS FIGHT FOR SUGAR

(Idahoan Charges 'Terrific' Obstacles Confront Domestic Industry)

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Representative Henry Dworshak (R-Idaho), in a statement given out here today, asserted that effort to improve the sugar beet industry is confronted by "terrific political and economic obstacles." His statement said:

"The terrific political and economic obstacles confronting the sugar beet industry in this country were disclosed in hearings conducted by the subcommittee on the agriculture committee of the House.

"Representatives of the refinery, cane growers, beet producers, and island interests appeared for legislation protecting their respective rights. The amazing development was that there was such divergence of views and lack of cooperation, consisting of only about 10 per cent of the sugar consumed in the United States is produced in this country, and that the retail price of sugar is lower than almost any other commodity.

"Officials of sugar beet associations pleaded for increased production quotas permitting normal expansion of the industry. The national president emphasized that, after 18 years of sugar beet production, the beet growers are receiving lower returns than previously. Administration of the sugar act prescribes duty free prices as charged, and likewise it was alleged that 70 per cent of the Cuban sugar interests are owned by Wall Street banks.

"President Roosevelt reflected his position to any material restriction in the sugar act. It is apparent that the chief executive is primarily interested in off-shore producers' claims that purchase of their sugar would create better markets for American agricultural commodities; that he favors the current production quotas, and is opposed to decreased marketing facilities because of the threat of higher prices to consumers. Obviously, the president wants no new production, and with control through his party of the agriculture committee and both branches of Congress, it is unlikely that any con-

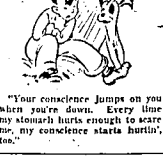

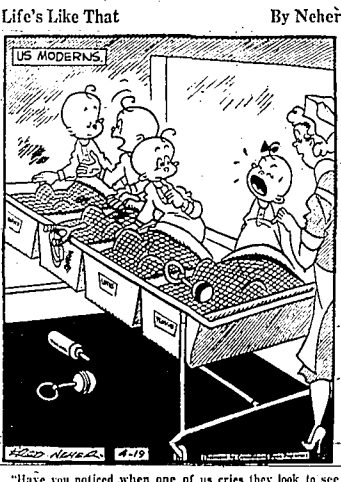
