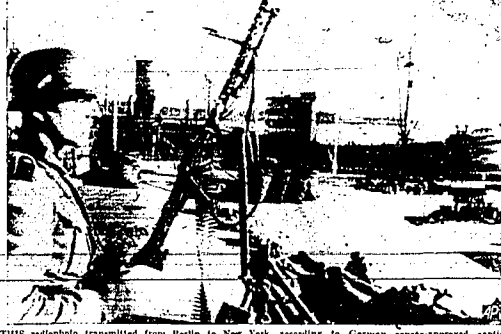

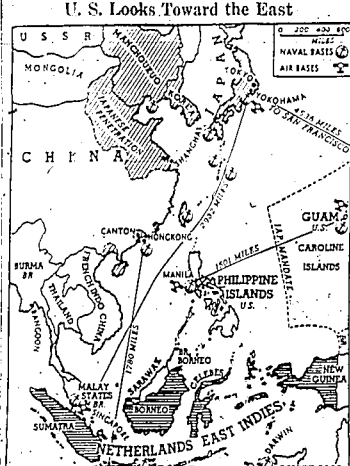

### IDAHO EXECUTIVE TO ENTER RACE

#### Botolfinsen Expected to Announce Candidacy After G. O. P. Convention

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—Republican sources say that C. A. Botolfinsen, who became on Jan. 3, 1939, Idaho's first Republican governor in eight years, will announce shortly after the Republican convention May 6 at Lewiston his intention to seek the nomination for a second consecutive term.

So far he has only one opponent, Thomas McDougal of Pocatello, a relative of District Judge Jesse McDougal of Pocatello and of the late D. C. McDougal, attorney general of Idaho from 1907 to 1910.

Botolfinsen has been executive in her 50 years of statehood. First of his 16 predecessors in office successfully sought reelection, and during the last quarter of a century all but one—Marilla W. Clark—were returned to office for a second term and in one case, that of Dr. Ben Rice, for a third.

Note has announced yet for the Democratic nomination for governor, but these men have been alive-in-that-direction—Mayor Chase Clark of Idaho Falls, Attorney General C. C. Gossett of Nampa, and W. P. Whitaker of Pocatello, who twice previously has sought the nomination.

#### Little Activity

The activity of candidates is apathetic this year compared with others. In the last election certain candidates announced as early as the December previous to the primary.

#### Four for Senator

United States Senator John Thomas of Gooding picked up an opponent with Elvin Daleney of Pocatello announced for the Republican nomination for the second remaining year of the late Senator William E. Borah's term. That makes two Republicans in the race for that nomination.

Senator George Donart, Welser attorney, so far has drawn no opponent for the Democratic nomination. Glen Taylor, Pocatello radio manufacturer.

Congressman Henry Darnack (re-Idaho) still is unsupported for the Republican nomination for a second term.

No Democrat yet has announced for the office.

No opponent has formally entered the contest for Congressman Compton J. White's five months seat. Two Republicans seek nomination: Rep. Ed Grafney of Orofino and Dr. Rex Henson of Coeur d'Alene.

#### Woman Will Preside

If Ben Davis of Pocatello, Democratic state chairman, doesn't get back from the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minn., by April 22, the task of presiding at the Democratic state committee meeting will fall to Mrs. Robert Elder of Coeur d'Alene, vice chairman.

The committee will meet to decide on the date and place for its delegate convention.

The business of that convention is to elect a national committeeman, a national committeewoman and delegates to the national convention.

The Republicans will hold their convention at Lewiston May 6. Ramsey Walker of Coeur d'Alene is up for reelection as national committeeman, Ralph J. Davis former president of the Young Democratic clubs of Idaho, is talked for also for that position. Mrs. Will Simons of Boise the national committeewoman.

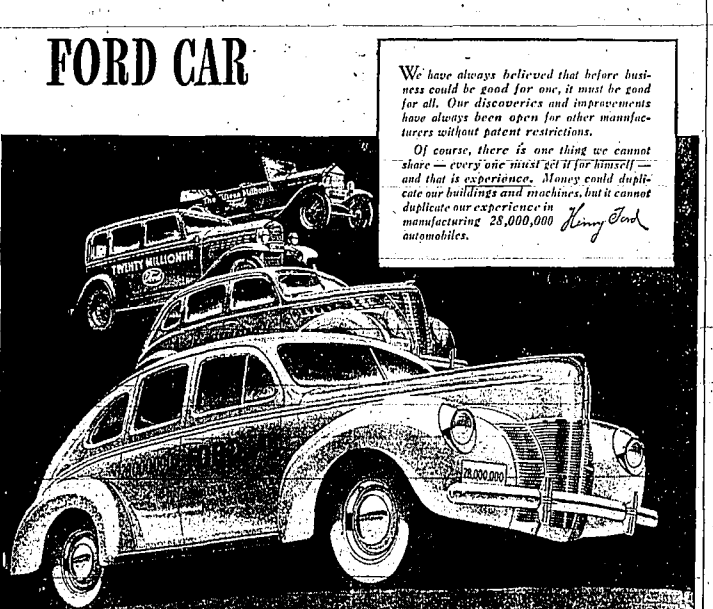

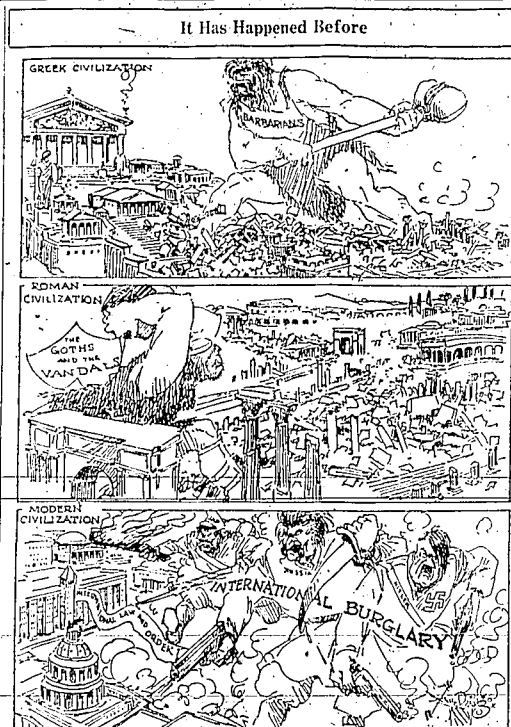

LEGAL TEST FOR PARKING METERS

Two Boise Merchants Appeal to Court to Prohibit Devices

BOISE, April 20 (AP)—Suits were instituted in federal district court here today to prohibit the operation of automobile parking meters in the downtown district of Boise and elsewhere in the city from entering into an agreement to purchase meters at a cost of approximately \$35,000.

The suits were brought by two Boise merchants, O. J. Foster and C. R. Little, who are represented by former Attorney General Frank Martin and Homer Martin, both of Boise.

Named as defendants were the municipal corporation, Mayor James L. Straight, members of the city council and Police Chief A. E. Uley. Attorneys for the two merchants recalled that an injunction was obtained in 1936 prohibiting the operation of the meters in Spokane, and that that case now is pending before the Washington state supreme court.

The same attorneys recited in their complaint that the special city charter prohibits the council from entering into any agreement involving the purchase of any equipment for more than \$100 without advertising for bids and receiving bids.

They also called attention to a provision of the state constitution which limits municipal indebtedness and approved by a two-thirds vote of the voters of a city.

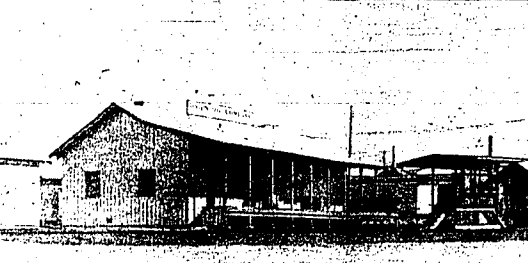

Republicans Count on Convention Keynote

Party Leaders Choose Minnesota's Young Governor for Important Task

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—A veteran newspaperman once referred to the "keynote address," which traditionally starts off a national political convention, as a "one-edition wonder."

His three-word summary of that ancient institution was not far wrong. Usually it amounts to a soundly, full-throated glorification of the party of the speaker and a booming, horrified denunciation of the alleged vices of the opposition. It has its scant moment in newspaper headlines and then is lost forever in the business of writing a platform and picking a nominee.

Other ideas But this year the Republicans have other ideas about their keynote address. They want to refer to its intended basis of usefulness, and make it a forceful presentation of the party's case that will at the outset draw the attention of the country favorably upon the convention and campaign to follow.

The first step in this reestablishment of an old political institution was to pick up on the party's old line, old-time orators in selecting the man who will make the speech. That job, the party leaders this week chose a man who is not yet old enough to run for the presidency—governor Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota.

Stassen came to Washington and addressed the Gridiron club. Politicians already impressed with his accomplishments found that Minnesota already knew what he was also a speaker of unusual charm, force and fire. That clinched the matter and got him his job as keynote.

New Blood When convention time comes, he will be presented as an example of the new blood and the youthful vigor which is said to be adding its way into the party. Whether that viewpoint will have any dominant say in what the convention does later is, of course, another question.

In politics there are always scuffles, and there are references to Stassen as a "window dresser" for another convention controlled by the party's old line forces.

There seems no doubt, however, that Stassen has caught the eye of important elements in the party. He is too young for 1940, but there will be other campaign years, and to the parlance of the political trade, Stassen is unquestionably being "promoted" for something more important than a governorship.

The week brought to Senator Taft (R.-Ohio) his most difficult decision as a presidential candidate. His campaign strategy has been to rely on the convention votes and his own Ohio as a nucleus, and add to them such delegates as could be obtained by negotiation with state organization leaders in the south and west.

On that basis his managers have been claiming close to 200 votes in reference to Stassen's strategy, he has entered only a single state presidential primary—Ohio, where he has no opponent.

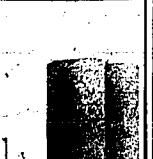
Senate Defeat But, in explaining a few weeks ago why he would not enter such preference primaries in the middle west, he said his senate duties would not permit him to campaign in those

faraway states. But, his supporters contended that he might go into nearby Maryland and West Virginia.

Last week he had his projects ready to file in the latter state. He wanted to see if any other candidate would enter too. None did, so the Taft papers were not filed. The West Virginia organization is with him.

But this week, the Dewey group got the backing of the Republican organization heads in Maryland. DeWeying their man unobtainable with such support, elected at his success in the middle-west and looking forward to winning Taft in Maryland as they had Vandenberg in Wisconsin and Nebraska, the Deweyites entered him for the coming Maryland primary and dared Taft to come in, too, and make a race of it.
