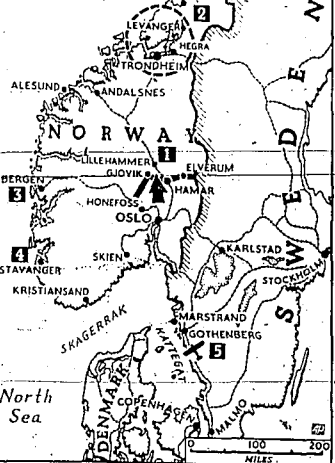

Furious Battle at Sea Reported in Skagerrak; British Shell Narvik

Germans, Allies Square Off Warships and Planes Set New Mark for Ferocity in War in Norway



STOCKHOLM, April 23.—A sea-and-air warfare, sparked by an attack on a German transport convoy, was reported today in the Skagerrak tonight while allied troops in Norway threatened Nazi positions on three fronts.

The Stockholm newspaper Nya Dagligt Allehandan reported from Sweden's west coast that warships and airplanes were engaged in two battles in the Skagerrak.

From the roar of gunfire off the coast it said the fighting seemed likely to prove the most severe in the war since the German invasion of Norway.

Many fighting ships were involved in the battle and at one point 10 destroyers were reported to be engaged in the sea off the coast of Narvik.

The German effort to be concentrated on cutting the railroads between Hamar and Andalsnes, Norwegian west coast, and a debarkation point for the British force, to isolate the Hamar sector.

In Trondheim Area Another major battle seems to be in progress off the coast of Trondheim, where the British apparently were trying to surround ships from Trondheim, some 100 miles north, and Andalsnes, the same distance south. At some points the line was separated by only a few hundred yards.

The Norwegian command's counter-attack against German tanks on both sides of Lake Mjøsa was supported by artillery, tanks and aircraft.

The Germans were attacking in Osterdal, the river valley running north from Trondheim, and in the north, with the Norwegians advancing in Valdres river valley, west of Lake Mjøsa, where they captured 100 German prisoners.

Allied, Nazi Armies Lock in Major Battle

Fighting on Three Fronts as Struggle Begins for Gate to Oslo

LONDON, April 23.—The tide of war on the hard northern battleground boiled tonight into southern Norway and found Allied and German troops, alike far from home, engaged in a battle of seeming decision for the "gate" to Oslo and, perhaps, command of the invaded nation's destiny.

At home, on the day of St. George, Britain's patron saint, the war front hardened, too.

Alfred Duff Cooper, former war secretary and first lord of the admiralty, gave voice to the increasing sentiment of the "great German" school of high-browed critics through the night.

THEFT OF BOMB SIGHT THWARTED

Sentry Halts Trespasser Attempting to Break Into Hangar

WASHINGTON, April 23.—An alert sentry at the Quantico, Va., marine base thwarted a trespasser attempting to break into an airplane hangar with a force before dawn today.

The trespasser, a man in a dark suit, was seen by the sentry as he attempted to steal a bomb from one of the nation's most precious military secrets.

The man fired at the sentry when he was seen, wounding him slightly in the abdomen, and fled. The sentry's name was not disclosed.

Natchez, Miss., April 23 (Wednesday)—Sheriff Hyde H. Jenkins said at least 100 Negroes were burned to death in a dance hall fire here late last night.

Others estimated the death toll at possibly as many as 150. R. E. Smith, managing editor of the Natchez Democrat, said the bodies were "piled up like cordwood."

Almost all the Negro population of Natchez gathered at the scene after midnight.

Twenty-four other Negroes, burned or injured in the stampede to leave the flaming building, were taken to hospitals.

Smith, who also is county coroner, said the building which formerly was a church and had an exit only at the front. The windows had been boarded up.

The hall was decorated with Spanish murals, and apparently caught fire near the front, trapping the Negroes inside.

Bodies in Heap Most of the bodies were found in a heap near the bandstand at the rear. It was estimated that several hundred Negroes were in attendance.

The hall, known as the Elvish night club, featured regular dances at which music was furnished by a nationally known band.

Located on St. Catherine street, in the Negro section, the building was only a few blocks from the commercial district of Natchez.

Idaho's valuations—on utilities—are fixed by each county assessor. Utilities valuations are fixed by the state board of equalization.

Leatham also said consolidation of schools in Utah had resulted in a uniformity of instruction and raised the standards of education.

In 29 Utah counties, there are only 31 or 32 districts, whereas in Idaho's 41 counties there are hundreds of 120.

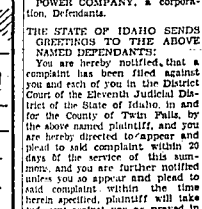
