CENSUS DRIVES TOWARD FINISH

All Asked to Cooperate as Enumerators Speed Population Count

Twin Falls population census enumerators are working from 12 to 14 hours daily in an effort to complete their work by this week-end, officials announced last evening, and urged local residents to cooperate with those taking the count.

Completion of some of the remaining four unfinished districts is expected within a matter of hours. Five have been closed out by census officials. When completion of other districts is announced, residents of those who have not been enumerated, are asked to call the census office in Twin Falls, Idaho, at the Commercial, phone 970.

Action of certain residents in refusing to cooperate with enumerators not only delays the census but will nullify the work of civic leaders who are seeking a thorough census. It was pointed out, and full cooperation of everyone with the census takers is requested.

WOMAN STRICKEN DURING HEARING

Felony Charged Man's Wife Collapses as State Unfolds Evidence

An elderly woman collapsed and was taken from the court room in an ambulance during preliminary hearing here yesterday for the murder of Roy May, 51-year-old Twin Falls plumber, accused in a rape charge involving a 16-year-old girl.

No evidence in May's behalf was offered, but Probate Judge C. A. Bailey overruled Defense Attorney W. L. Dunn's motion for dismissal and held May to answer in the district court, increasing bond from \$500 to \$10,000. May previously had been at liberty under the lesser bond.

Evidence indicated the girl had been employed in the homes of the Mays and their married son. She asserted attacks occurred last March 1, in the vicinity of Castletown where the girl testified. May had persuaded her to accompany him, she had sat at a hotel table that day. The state's case was presented by Roy Agee, deputy prosecuting attorney.

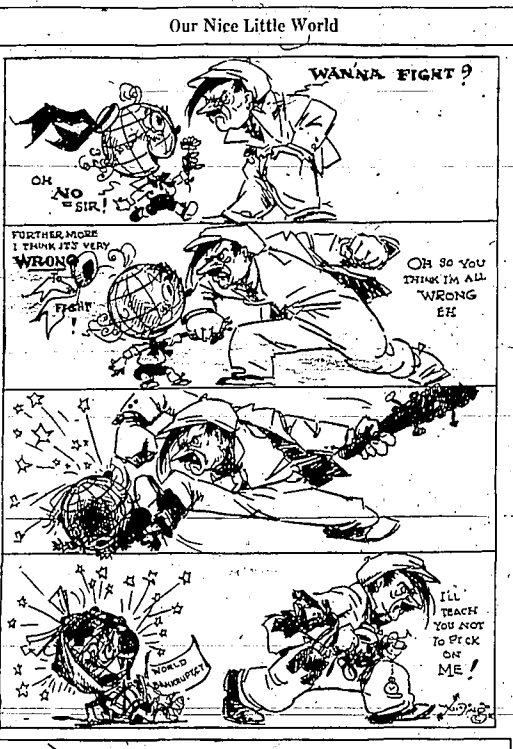

Shooting his famous "nothing" ball across the plate in a 40 degree temperature, Dean bested the Reds' big mound star, Paul Derringer, in a speedily played game which had 6,000 fans giving Diz a great cheer at the finish. Dean walked four batters and only had one strikeout, but it came on the final out of the contest and at the expense of pinch hitter Wally Berger.

Dean, in winning his first game of the season in two starts and also managing the string of consecutive victories Derringer carried into the contest, appeared headed for a great career for the game, was five minutes old.

Bill Werber, Reds' lead-off man, opened the game with a pass and Lou Poffo also drew a base on balls. Earl Goodman bunted safely and he was hit on the back by Dean's throw, Frey scoring and Diz getting an early on the play.

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Bimelech, the shortest Kentucky derby winner book favorite in history, clinched his spot as the horse to beat in the Churchill Downs classic today by easily defeating two other derby candidates—Roman and Bashful Duck.

Col. E. R. Bradley's never-beaten son of Black Tony—La Troienne, looking and running like the great champion he is, captured the \$5,000 added Blue Grass stakes before a record crowd of nearly 10,000 persons in the feature race of the closing card at Keeneland race course.

The winner's owner, Col. E. R. Bradley, whose horses have won four Kentucky derbies, said after today's race: "Bimelech is the grandest horse I ever saw."

Watching from his automobile, Colonel Bradley saw "Big Bill" car Joseph E. Widener's highly-regarded Roman in the back stretch and gradually widen the margin to finish in an easy gallop two and a half lengths in front, with Bashful Duck, Bimelech's stablemate, three lengths back of the winner horse in the three-horse field.

Time for the mile and eighth—two eighth shot of the derby tour—was 1:51. The Bradley entry paid out on a \$1 bet at 15 to 1. Only who bet was accepted.

It was Bimelech's first start this year. After the race Trainer William Hurley said both Bradley clubs money in the derby unit at Churchill Downs next Tuesday and that Don Meade, former Idaho youth, who was reinstated by the Kentucky state racing commission today, may ride Bashful Duck in the derby, May 4.

Meade, who was ruled off the turf in 1934 for Bradley's book, the Derby to victory in the 1937 Kentucky derby.

Declaring his squad was "not quite ready" to make its best showing, Coach Hank Powers yesterday was far from optimistic over chances of a Bruin victory.



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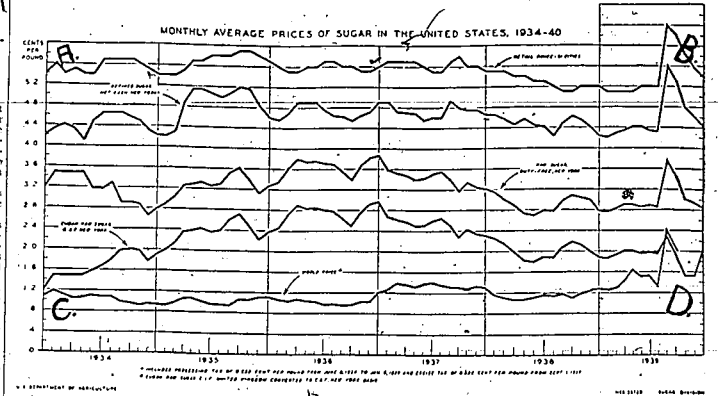

ROGERSON CAMP TO THREE CREEK

Past Accomplishments Given With Announcement of Shift

Grading service, CCC camp G-143 has been moved from Rogerson to Three Creek about 20 miles from here, project superintendent Wallace Hestrick announced while in Twin Falls yesterday.

A "spike" camp of 30 men will be maintained at the Rogerson camp to complete the remaining eight miles of fence being constructed on the Idaho-Nevada state line, the Indians.

Roads and water developments will be constructed by the Three Creek camp during the summer under supervision of the grading service. Company strength is now at 210 men and 100 new engines from Ohio.

While the camp was at Rogerson, the following improvements were completed: six miles of power line from American in Rogerson to give back the camp and the monthly "hot" water; 1000 gallons of water; the Three Creek bridge on the Rogerson-Jarvis road; 10 miles of the Rogerson-Jarvis road completed with crushed rock surfacing; 45 miles of deer road; 10 miles of road improved; six and one-half miles of grading on the Ridge route truck trail; 10 miles of dirt fence completed on the Idaho-Nevada state line; completion of the cattle guard on the DeLano mine road; and completion of the Three Mile and Rabbit Springs with metal troughs with a capacity of 1200 gallons each. The development of these water holes made it possible for the stockmen to make the year around in otherwise arid territory.

Meteorograph on Desert Discovered

CAREY, April 25 — A radio meteorograph, which has been sent out from the United States weather bureau at the monthly "hot" water, is in the weathered condition of its container, was found April 14 about 1200 miles east of Carey on the desert at the head of Laidlaw park by Roy Ross, a sheep herder in the employ of James Turnbull of Carey.
