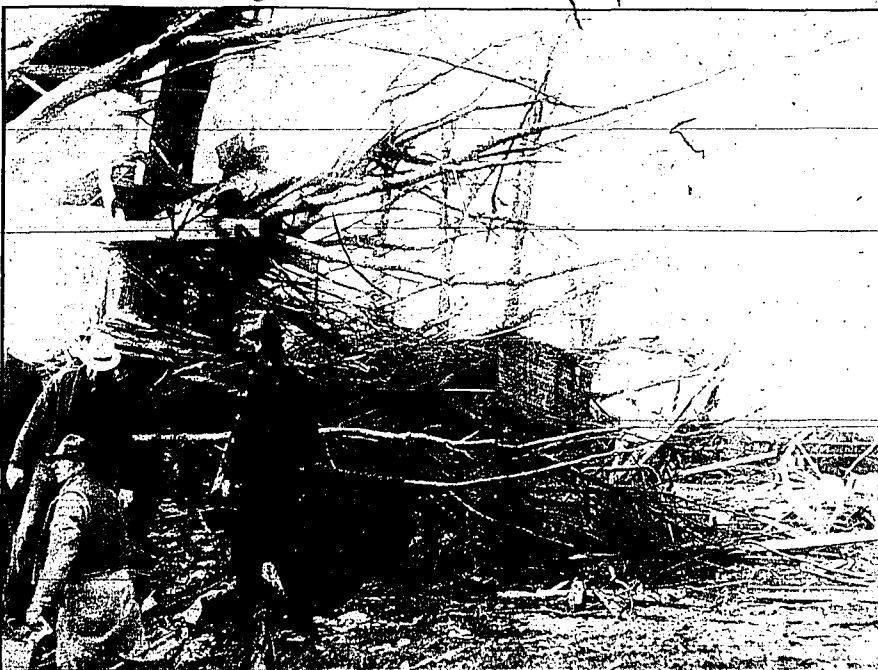
TORNADO. HITS GOODING-WENDELL AREA

Battling Forces Come to Grips At Lillehammer

POWER LINES, HOUSES FALL; TWO INJURED

Damage Estimated at \$20,000 to \$50,000 Results From Blasting Storm's Sweep Over Half-Mile Path

GOODING, April 26—A tornado, rare in Idaho annals, struck near here late this afternoon soon after it left a trail of destruction along a half-mile path west of Wendell, killing livestock and demolishing buildings at a loss estimated from \$20,000 to \$50,000 to Gooding ranchers and unfortunates in Wendell, where damage was not so heavy. Two men, one a census taker, were seriously injured.

The big twister was first visible several miles southwest of Wendell and struck the E. G. Commons turkey breeding flock at 1:20 p. m. killing an estimated 500 turkey hens out of Mr. Commons' 2500 head of breeding stock. Witnesses said the turkeys were literally picked up into the air scattered for three-quarters of a mile.

Strips Of Shingles Blasting northward, the tornado struck the Murray River pines, uprooting trees, flattening farm buildings and stripping all the shingles from the house.

At the Otto Fletschman ranch, the twister unloaded a wagon of hay, blew it in the door of the home and "painted" the walls with hay, besides blowing over the silo, spreading a large layer of hay and killing small livestock.

Northward, two miles west of Wendell, the twister struck the home and drove a two by six timber from the structure through the nearby farm house, throwing it out of plumb. A steel windmill was twisted out of shape, was blown over and small livestock was killed.

Other ranches along the path of the tornado were damaged, but none so severely as these five.

Soon after the twister passed over Wendell, a lightning storm accompanied a flash fire in the transformer at St. Valentine's hospital. Damage was slight, however.

First home in the Gooding section to fall before the tornado, which yesterday afternoon tore a wide path through the Wendell-Gooding district, was the Marvin Thomson home three miles west of the Gooding county seat on the Old Hills highway. Ruins of the \$2000 structure were scattered about the site.

Members of the family were away when the twister struck. Large trees were hurled down and into the wreckage to act as the shatterer. The twister struck the Thomson home from the ground and then shattered it with explosive force. Two stoves and an iron sink were all that could be salvaged.

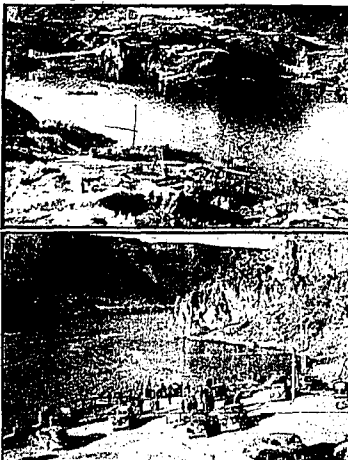

### Idaho Chamber of Commerce Estimates \$23,000,000 Income

BOISE, April 26 (AP)—L. P. Carson, secretary of the state Chamber of Commerce, predicted today that Idaho's tourist trade in 1930 will reach a new all time peak.

He estimated that tourists received \$23,000,000 in Idaho in 1929. "Each day brings to our offices from 50 to 100 inquiries for information relative to Idaho, from all sections of the United States, Canada and South America," said Carson.

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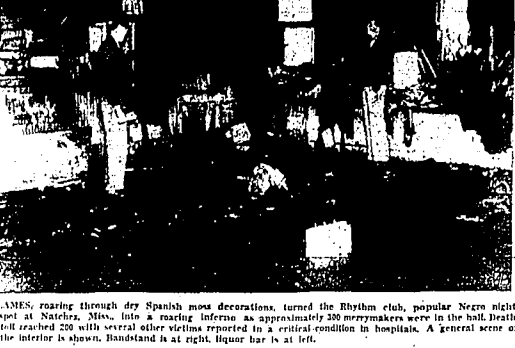
