ALLIES KEEP FOOTHOLD IN POLICY AREA

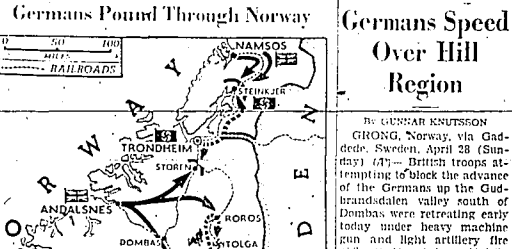
British Troops and Alpine 'Blue Devils' Face Job Of Securing Bases for Coming Reinforcements

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, April 27.—The allies, doggedly clinging to a foothold in the enemy's policy area, tonight put British infantrymen and rugged French Alpine "Blue Devils" with light artillery and fighting planes to the tough task of securing bases and communications lines for coming reinforcements before trying to fan out in a southward offensive.

A week of tentative threats which saw British and Norwegian commands forced to pull back various detachments under the deadly pounding of German mechanized troops, and the British policy with the situation resolved into a fighting race for advantage in communications.

Supervisor Gives Data on Dairy Herd Improvement Association Check

Dairy herd improvement for March on the Gooding-Jerome and Twin Falls Milk-Cow associations were announced last evening by Supervisor Bernard Laska.

The Twin Falls Milk-Cow association report shows that during the month 38 herds were tested. Of the 414 cows in the association, 370 were milking and there were 39 dry cows. Milk produced totaled 307,069 pounds, and total pounds of butterfat were 12,233.3. Average pounds of milk produced per cow were 793 and the average for butterfat was 31.0.

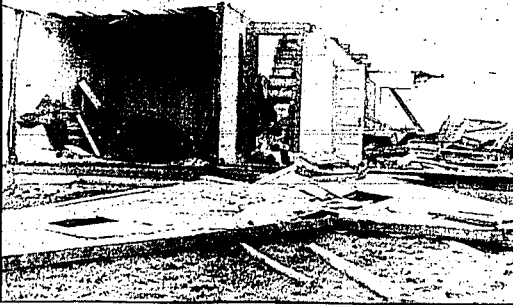

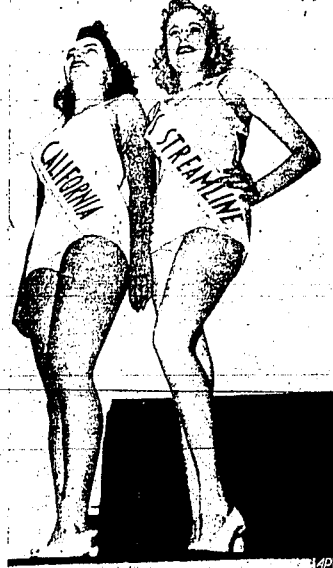

HIGH WATERS WASH AWAY ANGLERS' HOPES

Conditions Poor For Opening of Fishing Season

Most Streams Bankful, Survey Shows; Trolling in Reservoirs Best Bet for Good Early Catches

By PHIL HARRING
BOISE, April 27 (P)—Water ran high in Idaho's streams today, washing away hopes of most anglers for good early fishing.

The trout season in most sections opens May 1 this year, a month earlier than usual, but R. G. Cole of Boise, past president of the Idaho wildlife federation, doesn't think it will do sportsmen much good.

"Other years, maybe 50-60 Cole opined, but this season, according to reports, many of the best fishing places have high water. Rain in the past few days has brought low streams, too, he added. Cole said some waters, while high, were fairly clear, however, and anglers who went on with steelheads running in both the Little Salmon and Snake rivers in southeastern Idaho are thankful but not too luddy, he went on, with steelheads running in both the Little Salmon and Snake rivers.

"Goose creek, in the same area, is open from Craterholm hot springs and is fairly clear.

The Boise and Snake rivers are in the main too high for good fishing, although the Snake in northern Idaho holds some prospect of success for anglers in that area, Cole added.

In south-central Idaho the Wood river is high, but fairly good fishing is still possible for steelhead and trout. Part of Silver creek has cleared for the season, but the remainder will not open until July 1.

Reports of fish and game department conservation officers indicated the Bear river was yielding fair catches of cutthroat trout and water declared in "good condition." The Snake river was high at Blackfoot, but fish and game department officials remained silent as to whether the river was satisfactory, but the stream still was running. Water was high in the Kelly canyon.

In the inland park area on the north fork of the Snake conservation officers reported conditions too good. There was no news of the Teton river, but it was believed high. Meanwhile, fish and game department officials reminded anglers that only permits over 10, seasons of the civil or American waters, blind persons and children under 16 years of age may be accompanied by one parent or guardian, and pointed out that licenses are lost another must be bought.

Catch limits of trout, bass, catfish, crappie or sunfish are 25 fish or 10 pounds and one fish in any one day, or 20 pounds and one fish in possession, or 10 pounds daily.

Salmon eggs are prohibited except to Snake river. For specific restrictions fishermen were cautioned to consult their licenses. Closed areas will be posted.

With the trout fishing season opening next Wednesday in most sections of Idaho, Gray, district conservation officer, reminded anglers that use of salmon eggs is prohibited in most sections, except Snake river.

Days also listed for trout and lakes which will remain closed, and announced that Rock creek, previously reported closed for one year, would open to all fishing May 1.

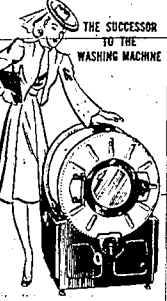
Under the proposed plan, truck lane would become an alternate.

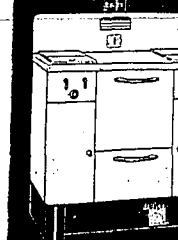
