Perils Pointed Out in Path of Expected Northward Drive Along Trails and Fjords

STOCKHOLM, May 4.—A German push northward toward Narvik, along hazardous mountain trails and fjords, exposed to the guns of the allied fleet, was predicted by military experts in Stockholm tonight.

Wind at times reaching a velocity in excess of 40 miles an hour, brought dust and gloom and some damage Saturday to many parts of Utah and southern Idaho.

Weather bureau reports indicated the center of the blow was in the neighborhood of Twin Falls, where the breeze blew at almost a 50-mile maximum, uprooted a number of trees and caused temporary disruption of telephone and power service.

In Upper Valley cities also felt the sting of the wind. A pall of salt hung over Idaho Falls with visibility in prospect of being obscured.

Further south, at Montpelier, Idaho, and in Utah's Cache valley power transmission was temporarily interrupted.

The entire Salt Lake valley was blanketed with a dusty haze which touched a peak of 41 miles an hour at the Salt Lake airport and was topped at one tree in the Utah capital.

The storm extended deep into central Utah as well as into Utah's southern slopes, with winds blowing above normal. Salt Lake City recording 32 degrees, highest of the year to date, and Green River, Utah, 31 degrees.

Germany Claim Bombers Sink British Battleship

BERLIN, May 4.—Air Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering, commander of the German air force, proudly announced today the feat which he and Adolf Hitler had charged the German air force in Norway to achieve at any cost—the sinking of a British battleship by air bombardment.

In all, formal Nazi statements said, nine British warships of transports were sunk or badly damaged during a day of attacks by bombers and battle-planes off Narvik and Norway, yesterday, while the British fleet was transferring allied troops who have abandoned central Norway.

Goering said that the sinking of the battleship, one of the most powerful ships in the world, was a "great victory" for the German air force.
