WASHINGTON, May 9.—Ignoring an impassioned plea by Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky, the senate voted 45 to 36 today to pass legislation terminating the administration policy of buying foreign silver.

But a powerful coalition of Democrats and Republicans apparently agreed with Senator Townsend (R-De) authoring of the bill to stop the buying, that the United States now has more silver than it needs and that gold is a more valuable asset.

BRITAIN STAKES HOPE ON NARVIK

Loss of Far Northern Norwegian Port Would Be Severe Blow

By KIRKE L. SIMPSON

Britain's war leadership, wherever holds the helm as prime minister, is under a stern new mandate to get on with the war with Germany as it gets out.

This is the new result of a fury of parliamentary debate over the Norwegian campaign that all but shook the Birmingham business man, Neville Chamberlain, out of power and yet may lead to its retirement in favor of a younger and more aggressive man.

Chamberlain's war distinction between the Narvik and Trondheim operations. He virtually committed himself as major strategist of the Chamberlain ministry or as he appeared in the prime minister's chair to hold Narvik against the German "fortress" at all costs.

It was our duty to do our best to help the Norwegians," Churchill said. "For that the capture of Trondheim was the best way."

Mr. Churchill indicated that the major allied purpose in the war was to close the Narvik door to German imports of Swedish iron ore.

Against that background, the battle of Narvik still rages today on deep significance. Only a handful of German troops and armor set ashore from Nazi destroyers sunk by British naval action compose the besieged garrison. Its strength is estimated at from 3,000 to 4,000 men.

Next relief columns are surging up from the Trondheim front toward Narvik. According to British reports, Nazi bombers are daily reported lumbering at allied investing forces at the vital port.

The grim fact of German air superiority to which both Chamberlain and Churchill attributed the allied defeat at Trondheim must still be reckoned with. Without that, the stand of the German garrison at Narvik—a stand that is attaining heroic proportions—would be hopeless.

Snow storms reported hampering the allies' attack at Narvik may well be producing them also from the fall effect of Nazi air bombing. Weather conditions in the next few days may hold the key to possession of Narvik, and to hopes of the Chamberlain-Churchill leadership of surmounting the ordeal through which it is passing at home.

This loss of Narvik is far more serious blow to the allies than the Trondheim defeat cannot be doubted. It would topple not only Chamberlain but Churchill into the political discard.

IRRIGATION GIFTS TOLD TO KIWANIS

Power Head Tells of Value to State: Points to Possibilities

New wealth which irrigation has brought to Idaho and additional irrigation possibilities, were discussed by C. C. Eberle, state president of the Idaho Power company, speaking before yesterday's luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Kiwanis club at the Park hotel.

Program Chairman Fred C. Farnier introduced Ralph Carpenter, vice manager of the Idaho Power company, who in turn presented Mr. Eberle.

Through a series of charts, the speaker demonstrated that the population and wealth of Idaho had increased as the amount of irrigated land increased. Idaho, with no irrigation in 1870, had a population of 15,800; but now has wealth of over a billion dollars, and a population of about one half million people.

The power official explained that each new irrigated acre multiplies three more than \$30 in new wealth which would mean more than an additional \$100,000 a year in new wealth. Statistics show that the farm dollar has a turn-over of about five times in this area.

LET'S SUPPORT OUR CHAMBER: Not very often does an individual like Carl Anderson, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, become discouraged.

About three weeks ago the campaign got underway, with the goal set at \$20,000. Less than one third of that amount has been obtained.

When the \$20,000 goal was first announced by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, some raised the question as to why such an amount was needed and others openly criticized the Chamber's enthusiasm.

Heretofore the Chamber of Commerce has staged an annual membership drive, which has netted all the way from \$3500 to \$6000 each year.

But now, when the Chamber of Commerce, undertakes to consolidate the solicitation for all these activities into one campaign, it meets about as much response as it would ordinarily get for its regular membership drive.

President Anderson and the board of directors have been doing a good job since they took over the reins of the Chamber of Commerce and because of the organization's recent accomplishments they are naturally enthusiastic.

Whether they are to receive sufficient financial support to carry out a constructive program during the coming year is a matter for the people of Twin Falls to decide.

Chamber committees are now engaged in furthering the drive. Interest in such projects as airport development and improvement of Highway U. S. 30 through this section, but public support has not been forthcoming, according to the chamber head. "Unless an amount substantially greater than that on hand at the present is raised, the chamber will be in less favorable position this year than ever in the past," President Anderson declared.

Services rendered by the chamber include institution of a rigidly enforced blue card system to protect merchants and consumers from unreliable solicitors and arrangements to discourage outside interests from "invading the community during major conventions with decoration schemes."

By ordering its own decorations for the city, including individual emblems of various organizations, the chamber plans to save thousands of dollars for merchants who would otherwise find it necessary to pay outside firms for decorations.

Curtailed of these and numerous other beneficial activities of the chamber can be the only result if more support is not given the campaign, concluded Mr. Anderson, urging that all citizens complete their work as soon as possible.

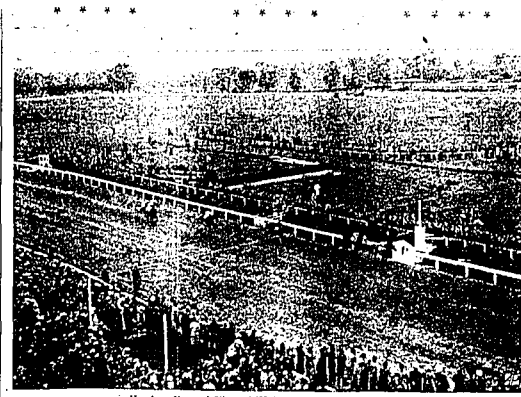
