Roosevelt Takes Steps to Hasten Nation's Defense

Growing Support Promised in Congress for Request Expected to Exceed \$500,000,000

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 13.—President Roosevelt acted today to speed up America's armament, working with military and fiscal officials on a request to congress for an extraordinary defense fund which reliable sources said would probably exceed \$500,000,000.

Initial reaction to the news of his intention indicated that a majority of the total war now raging in Europe, his recommendation would have many supporters in both house and senate no matter how large it might be.

Chairman McNary (D-Ky.) of the house military committee, who with Chairman Vinson (D-Ga.) of the house naval group was called to confer with Mr. Roosevelt, told reporters he favored an additional \$1,000,000,000 for the armament and navy combined.

Adding that he was for "anything the president asks," Mr. McNary said he would be glad to discuss a defense act or quit talking about it.

Mr. Roosevelt's round of conferences today on the augmented defense program coincided with four other important developments:

1. An allied spokesman announced today that the British had bought about \$250,000,000 worth of American airplanes and airplane parts within the British zone.
2. The question whether the United States should grant credits to the allies for the use of the home front.
3. President Roosevelt asked congress to make \$2,000,000 available immediately for the construction of aircraft carriers in Puerto Rico.
4. The war department estimated that 100,000 officers and men of the United States Army, Navy and reserve corps would be under arms in the next few months.

Officials said this would be a record number for peace-time training.

Loans to the French, English and Belgian governments are now being discussed by the Johnson act, which outlines advances to debt-defaulting nations, and credits to all of the belligerent governments are barred by the neutrality act.

Representative Bulwinkle (D-Mo.) introduced legislation to permit the allied governments to buy on credit in this country anything they need to carry on their war, armament and implements of war.

The proposal would alter portions of the neutrality law, and the Johnson act.

As to a question whether the forthcoming request for increased army and navy outlays would require that congress increase the present limit on the federal debt, Treasury Secretary Morgenthau said reporters it was a little early to say about that.

The federal debt, now \$44,723,958.86, is scheduled by the budget act to reach \$45,000,000,000 limit some time in the next fiscal year.

The additional expense which is contemplated in the measure the president will send to congress this afternoon.

An offer to introduce legislation to raise the debt limit, if you feel the government is unable to permit it before an election, was made during the day by Representative (Mich.), a member of the house banking committee.

"Why not be honest?" he asked at a committee hearing. "The debt limit has got to be raised."

Two Salients Mark Nazi Army Advance

Longest Thrust Points Westward Makes Contact With Parachute Troops

(By The Associated Press)
Germany's advance into the low countries now apparently is marked by two definite and threatening westward salients marked by its sweeps in an otherwise almost north-south line from the Zuider Zee's North sea outlet to the corner where France meets Belgium and Luxembourg.

The longest of these salients, according to German communiques, points westward across the Netherlands, making contact with advance parachute troops already dropped around Rotterdam.

DNB, official German news agency, boasted that this maneuver had outflanked the Special Holland fortification system.

The Netherlands command acknowledged that a "small section" of its main defense line had been taken by the Germans and that German forces also had reached a point in Brabant province just 45 miles south of Rotterdam.

This appears almost, though perhaps not quite, to have cut the Netherlands in two approximately along the line of the Rhine river. The Dutch never seriously considered defending, already are in German hands, the southern section of the great Netherlands frontier.

The Hague, already harassed by parachute troops and "fifth column" activities, is now being shelled by the second German spearhead, not so long as the first but possibly more threatening as far as the ultimate result of the war is concerned, stands into the Belgian fortifications at Liege, in east central Belgium.

The German claim to have taken the Liege "Citadel" and are also, a score of miles west of the city in an extreme step.

It was to try to break off this flank maneuver that the French counter-attacked heavily yesterday, claiming at least a degree of success.

The allied forces were being slowly pressed back, however, generally in a westerly direction.

The French said the heaviest fighting was in the Belgian Ardennes mountains, north of France, in a German attempt to sever the French division of infantry and armor, which the French declared this was the Germans' "real" thrust.

The French prediction that a "great battle" was imminent appeared likely to come true in Belgium, unless the fast-driving German motor troops, supported by swarms of airplanes, can sweep through both the 300 kilometers—some 100 miles—between the two fronts before they have finished mashing their men on some chosen battleground.

Nazi Thrusts Rip Holland, Hit Belgium

Hard Fighting Lowland Men and British-French Allies Fall Back on Long Front

Germany's hard-driving armies plunged one hand toward the vitals of The Netherlands and another into the heart of the Belgian defense last night while pushing the men of the two low countries and their British-French allies back along the far-flung battle front from the Zuider Zee to France.

But the allies, pledged to "victory at all costs," were massing their men in anticipation of a gigantic battle for which the present mighty conflict is only a preliminary skirmishing.

The Dutch removed their government from The Hague to an unidentified place as the high command gravely reported that the Germans had broken through part of their main defense line and also passed Moerdijk bridge across Hollandsch diep on the sea coast about 15 miles south of embattled Rotterdam.

The Nazis reported this thrust had made contact with the parachute troops previously dropped around Rotterdam and had outflanked the "so-called" Netherlands fortification system.

Such a move, almost cutting The Netherlands in two, endangers also the great cities of Amsterdam and The Hague, in the territory for whose protection the entire Dutch defensive strategy was organized.

The Germans already are admittedly established in the northern Netherlands provinces, which the Dutch did not seriously attempt to defend.

Adolf Hitler's exultant legions also reported they had seized the "Citadel" of Liege, on the northern edge of that great fortified Belgian city, although they acknowledged that other forts of the defenders still were putting up a fight.

A French military spokesman said the Germans had taken only one Liege fort, Eben Emael, 15 miles north of the city, which fell Saturday.

Fighting in Antwerp, Belgian and Dutch, however, admitted they were gradually giving ground all along the front.

The French said the heaviest fighting was in the Belgian Ardennes mountains, where 1,000 to 2,000 tanks supported a big infantry drive against allied communications.

The French also reported they had made a standing counter-attack 20 miles northwest of Liege, which cost the Germans many dead and wounded.

DUTCH COMMAND ADMITS LOSSES
Germans Pierce Famous Defense Line; Government Forced to Move

AMSTERDAM, May 13 (AP)—Outflanked from the north and from the south, with their famous Grebbe water defense line pierced and Rotterdam threatened by German motor columns but 15 miles away, the Dutch tonight, under heavy fire, announced that the seat of government and sent their quest to safety in England.

The Dutch high command acknowledged in a communique to the press that the Germans had succeeded in taking a "small sector" of the Grebbe line, little more than a water defense system running south of the Zuider Zee to the Rhine, and that although Rotterdam had been spared by fierce fighting had retained the sector they could not hold it when the Germans launched fresh attacks.

To the south, the high command acknowledged that Germans with motorized equipment had raced through the Lancaut, south of the Meuse river, and had reached and passed the Moerdijk bridge which crosses the Hollandsch diep by 15 miles south of Rotterdam.

In Rotterdam itself, German paratroopers had landed in force and were admitted still to be holding out "stubbornly."

The quiet Amsterdam was quiet tonight, truck loads of military police and soldiers rode through the streets.

Allied Troops Yield To Nazi Onslaughts

Withdrawal in Accordance With Strategic Plan, War Ministry Emphasizes

(By The Associated Press)
PARIS, May 13 (AP)—Allied advance columns reported their fire into "massive" German attacks in the Netherlands and Belgium today but gave ground all along the line except west of Liege, Belgium, where the French counter-attacked with tanks.

A French war ministry spokesman emphasized that while French, British, Dutch and Belgians were retreating slowly in the face of savage onslaughts by German motorized corps and "tremendous" blasting attacks from the air, the withdrawal was in accordance with strategic plan and could not be halted.

The heaviest fighting, the French reported, occurred in the Belgian Ardennes mountains, north of France, where the Germans thrust several divisions of infantry and armor by way of the low countries, between 1,500 and 2,000 tanks in an effort to sever allied communications.
