

THE FIRST ADVERTISEMENT which appeared in a newspaper had to be "sold" to the editor. History records that a Londoner, whose cow had strayed away, had the original bright idea of placing a notice, offering a reward for the animal's return, in a London newspaper. Ye editor, between, didn't respond to the proposal. Probably he exploded, "Gadzooks, man, what, and have a Holstein meandering among the chaste oclumns of this periodical, dedicated as it is to the pursuit of truth, heauty and penthouse murders? Egad, shrahi A thousand times no. And do not insist! Ye editor, dash it, will not be cowed!" But, ye editor, perhaps; was behind in his bar bill at the Purple Mouse, and so, in consideration of a slight cash reimbursement at last consented.

The first newspaper advertiser got results, however, and the editor, no doubt, got more credit at the Purple Mouse, so it soon became general to use newspapers for this purpose. Such ada as "Books for Sale," announcements of meetings, and personals began to appear, and were grouped together, so as not to offend the gentle reader. And thus, the beginning of "classified ads."

Today, however, Want Ads are a recognized public service, highly organized to serve most efficiently and effectively the needs of the community. Had the Londoner with the absent cow lived in Twin Falls or vicinity during 1940 he could have phoned an Adtaker of the News and Times and he would have courteously accepted his notice, helping him word his message, for maximum results and minimum cost. And he would have known that soveral hours after-ward his advertisement would be read in more than 16,000


