Senate Approves Huge Sum for Nation's Defense

Industry Pledges Roosevelt Full Cooperation in Pushing Through \$1,473,756 Program

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The prominent industrialists pledged President Roosevelt their "unflinching cooperation in pushing through the huge defense program today, while the senate heard an appeal that Adolf Hitler be told that American resources are dedicated to "his destruction as a force in the affairs of decent men."

The day, with a unanimity born of fatal times, the senate approved an appropriation of \$1,473,756,728 for the navy and its air force by a vote of 78 to 0. At the same time officials adopted plans for applying America's mass production units and techniques to the production of fighting planes and engines.

From the White House came word that Mr. Roosevelt would give the nation on Sunday night a "broadcast" and facing the nation the progress of his defense plans. Arrangements at 9:30 p. m. eastern standard time by three radio networks will be the president's first radio "fireside chat" since the opening days of the war.

HOUSE KICKS RELIEF BILL; REPEALS BOND PROVISIONS

Revamped Measure, Adopted 354 to 21. Prohibits Employment of Communists and Bund Members

WASHINGTON, May 23.—A 354 to 21 vote today in the House of Representatives to meet President Roosevelt's requests and to prevent employment of aliens, Communists and Nazi Bund members was passed by the house tonight and sent to the senate.

The roll call vote was announced as 354 to 21. With the Democratic majority in full command, the members approved the president's recommendation for a \$75,650,000 WPA fund with provision for him to use it in eight months beginning July 1, rather than to stretch it over the full year.

Britain Braces for Invasion as Enemy Hammers Channel Ports

Rumania Calls 300,000 Reserves to Colors



VIRTUAL general mobilization, which called 300,000 reserves to the colors, was issued by the Rumanian government today in a move which diplomats believed was linked with Bucharest's fear of a Russian drive into Rumania, which in all Rumania also worried over a possible German thrust. Men seen at three recruits, arriving in Bucharest for military duty, escorted by a soldier, make up Rumanian's army.

Double Counter-Offensive on Somme, Flanders Fronts Imperils Germans

The allies, in fierce twin counterattacks from the north and south, blasted dents in the German salient to the English Channel Thursday night, imperiling the lightly-held Nazi spearhead pointed at the heart of Great Britain.

At the same time Britain made ready for a possible German attack on England itself. Strong naval forces patrolled the channel and troops were placed in south coast towns.

The giant allied pincer movement dented the German salient between the Somme and Flanders, where only thin lines of Nazi armored columns are matched against the French, British and Belgian attackers.

A French attack cracked the salient and reached the suburbs of Amiens from the south. At Outskirts of Cambrai

The French northward push in the Amiens area was matched by a southward allied drive some 45 miles to the northeast. The allied troops here reached the outskirts of Cambrai in a coordinated effort to chop off the Nazi wedge on both its top and bottom sides.

The French northern army, aided by British and French forces, carried the fighting from the north, between Cambrai and Valenciennes.

A third great battle was in progress some 110 miles to the east, along the Aisne river, in the Attigny sector, southwest of Sedan, where the French reported the repulse of a German attack in the southeastern corner of the broad German salient. This Nazi thrust was designed to flank the main Maginot line defenses.

The attacks at Amiens and Cambrai were aimed at light German forces holding the spearhead which runs through Abbeville, on the Somme river estuary 12 miles from the channel, and is threatening the Dover straits ports of Boulogne and Calais.

Despite the allied successes, British Minister of Information, Alfred Duff Cooper gravely told Britons that Calais, only 22 miles from the British coast, "even now" may be in immediate danger.

The British air ministry credited a lone bomber with placing four accurately aimed bombs which blasted a German munitions train from the rails at Gedeon, Germany, near the Dutch border, during a night of allied air raids on the Germans' front and rear which penetrated as deep as Leipzig, where an important power station was blown up.

Wave after wave of British bombers and fighters participated in a 6 1/2-hour attack aimed at the bombing of a German armored division headquarters. Most of the 100 high explosive bombs dropped were reported to have exploded "well within the target area."

Here is how the situation shaped up last night: The allied front ran from Belgium south along the Scheldt river to Valenciennes, where the allies reported the German salient broken. From there it goes southwest to Cambrai, where the French cracked the salient from the north, then west to Arras and southwest from there, cutting the Arras-Bapaume highway.

Then the line drops across the French-German border to the Somme river and runs east along the Somme and Aisne to Montmedy.

The Germans admitted that German columns had slipped through the allied lines between the Somme and Bapaume toward the sea. The German claim between 600,000 and 1,000,000 British, French and Belgian forces are trapped to the north of the German salient.

If successful, the French would engulf the German salient in a pincer-blast sector roughly headed by Abbeville, Cambrai and St. Quentin. General Wever's main snare was directed at Cambrai, the bottleneck of the German salient. The French tanks, mounted units and artillery, supported by bombing and strafing planes, sought their way to the outskirts of the city.

Iron Cavalry Pounds at England's Outer Gates

LONDON, May 23.—Menaced from two sides and facing a threat from within, Britain steeled herself tonight against possible invasion from the beleaguered cliffs of Dover to the shores of Ireland.

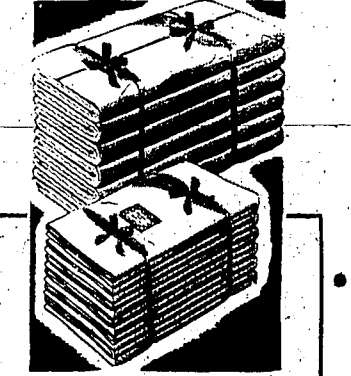

The 13,800-ton ship, temporarily withdrawn from the New York-Bermuda service, will leave tomorrow afternoon for Galway, Ireland, where the last Britishers to be taken aboard about May 20.

About 700 of the estimated 3,000 American living in Great Britain are expected to board the vessel and at least 100 are in Ireland now waiting for the Roosevelt's arrival.

Although the census was originally scheduled to terminate earlier, books were kept open in an effort to avoid omissions. Calls from those who believed they had not been included were received at the Chamber of Commerce and investigation has followed all such reports.

An earlier unofficial survey, presumably a complete population count, indicated that the census would show that about 13,000 persons are now residing within Twin Falls.

"The brain tumor problem is almost as formidable in psychiatry as the problem presented by epilepsy," Dr. Howard McIntyre declared, "and every state hospital for the insane should employ a competent neurologist to study all cases and determine whether tumors were the cause of the insanity of a patient."

## Ex-Sailor Gives Ceferino Garcia Lesson in Boxing

### Veteran Displays Ring Generalship in Taking Clear-Cut Decision Over Baffled "Bolo Puncher"

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—Ken Overlin, the ex-sailor boy from Washington, won the New York-California version of the world's middleweight championship from Ceferino Garcia tonight with a "cute" job of boxing and ring generalship as Madison Square garden has seen in a long time. Overlin weighed 150; Garcia, 154 1/2.

Before a slim, almost cozy, little gathering of fans, the much-travelled veteran took a 15-round decision from the slugging Philistine. What he really did, however, was to out-box-out-punch-out-fight-in fact, almost out-everything-Garcia throughout the tussle. The Phil was a baffled brawler when it was all over.



Only on rare occasions was Garcia able to hurt Overlin, and he died a steady right hand. The occasion was even rarer when he was able to land cleanly with his so-called "bolo punch." Usually Overlin took it on the shoulder, the arm, or didn't take it at all, dancing much of harm's way.

Eleven rounds to Overlin. The Associated Press score card gave Overlin 11 of the 15 rounds, the last five of them in a row. One of Garcia's best hits, the left, was taken away from Overlin for low punching. The referee called Garcia down on the part of Referee Arthur Donovan and both judges.

There were no knockouts. Although Garcia fell backwards to the floor in the first round, half from a push and half from a right cross, bouncing right up after a one-count. The crowd was announced to be 7,537 when the fight started at 10:17 p.m.

Tonight's activities may be the first step in the clearing up of the long-standing middleweight mess. Overlin's manager, Chris Dundee, is willing to take on Al Hoke of Chicago, recognized as the best of the national boxing association, and Nat Drumann, Seattle promoter, is willing to take on the best of the west, including Mike Jacobs, who has the possibility of taking the fight to his home town. However, Garcia had a return match agreement in his contract for tonight's affair and may decide to exercise that in 30 days.

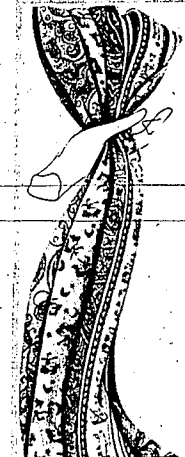
