London Heads Subcommittee at Work on Platform Declaration

PHILADELPHIA, June 18 (AP)—Obviously heading toward a platform declaration for material aid to the United States in the war, the Republican resolutions committee today passed a resolution, 1928 presidential nominee, at the head of the subcommittee appointed to consider the subject.

"The first duty is to set our house in order: The job of recovery is the recovery of jobs, to release capital and thus put to idle people, and to stop any money that would create new wealth and thus bring prosperity to the people."

Washington New Beats Cornell With Closing Drive

BROOKLYN LOSES GAME AND SERVICES OF JOE MEDWICK

Huskies Capture Second-Slowest Race on Hudson

Varsity Shells Finish in Fast-Growing Darkness After Officials Call Off Jayvee Event

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 18 (AP)—The University of Washington varsity outrigger Cornell's eastern spring champions tonight to win the four mile championship of the Intercollegiate Rowing association in the second-slowest race the Hudson river regatta has known.

In a thrilling duel that developed just as expected between the best of the west and the best of the east, the Huskies whipped the last half-mile of the upstream course into a lather to triumph by a margin that was the subject of wide and heated discussion.

It will go into the records as Washington, 22 minutes 42 seconds; Cornell, 27 minutes 45 seconds. Even on a slow river, this difference means about three quarters of a length. The experts on the winning team, admission ticket holders at the finish line on an inside didn't see how it could be done. It was a closer length at the outside.

Jayvee Boats Swamp
This night was the second-slowest variety made possible by the slowest entry regatta of all the 43 in the I. R. A. books. It started at 5 o'clock with a quarter-mile freshman race; continued at 4 with a mixed-gender attempt to start the Junior varsities. The latter promptly swamped in the first half-mile, and continued on through midnight until the eight varsity shells finished their battle in fast-growing darkness.

Syracuse, leader of the first mile and crew, staged a comeback of its own to beat navy for third place by almost a length. Columbia, last year's record-breaking winner, was a badly-distanced fifth, followed by Columbia, Wisconsin and Cornell. Navy was rowing here for the first time.

The only slower time was Columbia in 1928-29, that was the year five crews finished and four crews swamped, and the toll was a heavier this year on the Jayvees.

Syracuse Gives Up
They got a good start, but Washington almost had captured a hundred yards out. Syracuse, battling frantically, had to give up a half-farther on, and California went under just past the half-mile mark.

The officials decided to call it off at half-way, but Washington went away to a fine lead, had no idea of giving up, and Columbia and Cornell were bound to continue. When their coaches caught up with them and flagged them down, Columbia was down at the stern and Cornell's shell was half full of water.

Yoked in the main event, Cornell had to content with first place in the fresh two-mile. The 10-knot run with the breeze behind it was two lengths over Princeton, with Syracuse third and Columbia's previous undefeated record. To complete the picture of a daffy day on the water, the Jayvee team swamped in almost a half-hour, long after all the spectators had gone home. Finishing at a line marked by the lights of the bridge lights, Washington, first to swamp on the original attempt, won the three and last of the varsity navy, followed in order by Cornell, Syracuse, Columbia and California.

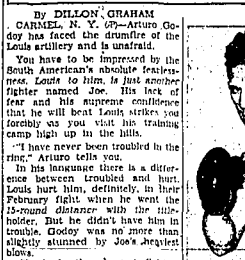

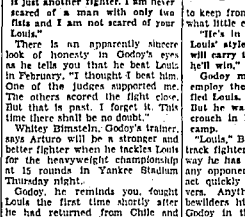

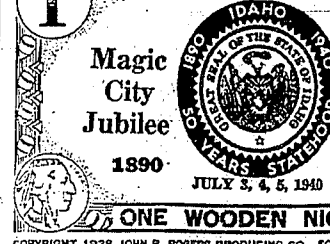
