Army trucks will cross the stage at the rear to present a fast moving scene of the country's participation in the conflict.

Twin Falls Pharmacist Taken by Heart Attack at Home Here

A heart attack shortly after noon yesterday claimed the life of J. R. Trolinger, 41, Twin Falls pharmacist, at his home at 121 Lake Lakes boulevard north.

Mr. Trolinger, who was well known as a sportsman and was a prominent member of the Magic City Athletic Association, was proprietor of the Trolinger pharmacy, which he established in Twin Falls about 15 years ago.

Born Aug. 30, 1899 at Cassville, Mo., he came to Twin Falls from that state. Besides being a member of the Kiwanis club, he was affiliated with the Moose lodge, Elks lodge, Christian church and Idaho Pharmaceutical association.

He underwent an operation at Temple university hospital last April 20, from which he had been apparently convalescing rapidly.

Cole, Veneta, Okla.; and his son, Dr. Houston Trolinger, who was here recently attending his medical degree from Temple university this spring.

CITY GETS NEW WATER STORAGE

Warm Weather Speeds Completion of 5,000,000-Gallon Reservoir

To meet the current pressing demand for a reserve water supply, accelerated work on the new 5,000,000-gallon reservoir south of Twin Falls has resulted in its completion. The reservoir was turned over to the city by the WPA yesterday, and filling operations will start tonight or Saturday.

Final waterproofing paint was placed on the structure yesterday morning and finishing with chemically treated water is scheduled for today. Filling with filtered water will be under supervision of L. G. Satterlee, filter plant superintendent.

The WPA expended about \$17,500 in labor and \$12,225 for materials, to \$4,500 for labor and \$2,250 for material and equipment by the city.

CANDIDATE ASKS LEGAL GAMBLING

McDougal Proposes Plan
to Legalize Retail
Liquor Sales

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—Idaho should permit retail sale of liquor by merchants, license gambling devices and legalize part-time betting on horse and dog races, Thomas McDougal, Republican gubernatorial nominee, declared today in an interview.

He filed his petitions of candidacy today. He for the state administrator of low-cost housing under former Governor Sherrill Clark is Governor Bolen's only primary opponent.

"Liquor already is being sold in violation of laws requiring the state to sell it exclusively," he explained. "We might as well come out in the open and stop this bootlegging."

Gambling, he went on, is being practiced "all over the state," and should be legalized so the state might derive revenue from it.

"Idaho should be the playground of the west," he went on. "We have all the natural advantages necessary. All that remains is to adjust our laws."

McDougal's primary objective in seeking the governorship, he added, is to put through legislation exempting home improvements from taxation.

He added he pledged his support to the Townsend recovery plan.

Wheeler Hits at War Propaganda

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.), urged both major parties today to nominate presidential candidates with records that the people would know their actions will not be controlled by that little handful of international bankers in New York who actually want to get us into war.

Wheeler asserted, in a statement, that he would "like to see" the nomination on either ticket of anyone who "has" in the meeting in New York which gave birth to the so-called William Allen White committee which is now propagandizing through national advertisements for American intervention in the European conflict.

He added that "we want to see this nation fully prepared to defend our shores against any nation, but the people of this country are overwhelmingly opposed to our entering into the European conflict."

Court Rules Upon Irrigation Leases

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—Lands irrigable within an irrigation district should be considered as a whole, the Idaho supreme court held today, and maintenance and operation charges should be the same for all lands within the district.

The opinion denied an appeal of the Boise River Irrigation district and its directors from the court of District Judge C. E. Winsted of Boise.

The court also held that maintenance and operation cost should be spread on all land of an irrigation district proportionately to the benefits received by them and that two methods of meeting maintenance and operation costs, one by uniform assessment and the other by tolls, are not allowable under Idaho law.

Idahoans Urged To Prevent Fire

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—State Forester Franklin Girard appealed today to Idahoans on week-end and July Fourth trips to use "every precaution possible" to prevent forest and range fires.

He warned state law prohibits throwing away a lighted tobacco of any kind, fireworks or other lighted material within any forest protective district.

"Since addition of many new forest protective districts in 1939 and 1940, usually all of Idaho is included," he pointed out, adding that not only wooded areas were protected but much desert land as well.

Patrols are out with instructions to enforce fire prevention regulations "rigidly," Girard said.

ROBBER SUSPECTS AT COEUR D'ALENE

Sherriff Overhauls Two Men
After Service Station
Hold-Up

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, June 27 (AP)—Sherriff S. J. McMillan said today he captured two men in the hills yesterday following robbery of a service station and wrecking of a stolen car.

The pair, booked on a charge of armed robbery, gave their names as Ray Church, 17, and Bill Ross, 25, a Negro.

Cigaret Dealers Get Tax Notice

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—All Idaho cigarette dealers must take an inventory of cigarettes June 30, in order to prepare for new national defense taxes. Collector John R. Wiley of the Internal Revenue bureau warned today.

"President Roosevelt signed the bill Tuesday which provided for a floor stock tax at the rate of 25 cents per thousand on all regular sized cigarettes and 50 cents per thousand on those weighing more than three pounds per thousand," Wiley said.

The levy is imposed on all manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers based on inventories June 30, and thereafter will be paid by the manufacturers.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 27 (AP)—Indiana Democrats, shopping it up in a today and wide open state convention, today picked Lieutenant-Governor Henry F. Schickler their standard bearer for governor and reelected United States Senator Sherman Simon, strong new dealer, without opposition.

They approved, though indirectly, a third term for President Roosevelt while cheering their own candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, federal revenue administrator Paul V. McNutt, who keynoted the convention with a "keep out of our speech."

The third-term endorsement came in an eleven-hour resolution which affirmed confidence in the "statesmanship, patriotism and fidelity to the ideals of Democracy of the distinguished former governor McNutt of this state" and endorsed his McNutt's position in advocating the recommitment of President Roosevelt.

The reference was to McNutt's Memorial day statement calling upon Mr. Roosevelt to be a candidate for a third term because of the international crisis.

Sponsor Figures Initiative Measure Lacks Many Signatures

BOISE, June 27 (AP)—An initiative measure calling for a two cent Idaho sales tax seems unlikely to qualify for next fall's ballot.

John I. Hillman, secretary of the Idaho Education association, sponsor of the measure, said today he estimated that he had about 800 signatures.

"We're going to be short, I think by a considerable number," Hillman commented. "Petitions are still coming in, but rather slowly."

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U. P. PRESIDENT EULOGIZES HOME

Greatness of U. S. Depends
on Respect of Home,
Jeffers Says

SUN VALLEY, Idaho, June 27 (AP)—The United States "shall be great just as long as we maintain and respect the authority of the home," President W. M. Jeffers of the Union Pacific railroad stated today in an address before the 10th West Coast Union meeting of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

Approximately 450 persons are attending the convention of the union and its auxiliary, W. and Jones of Pocatello is chairman.

Earlier, Governor Bottelton welcomed the visitors, calling for maintenance of the profit system as the only way in which American government can survive.

"One thing that is today weakening the moral fiber of our country," Jeffers said, "is that we are getting away from the influence of the home. Despite the excellent work done by the Boy Scouts and other youth organizations, nothing can replace the influence of a mother."

"We shall be great just so long as we maintain and respect the authority of the home."

Jeffers said the nation faced "more trying times" than ever before, but that he looked toward the future with confidence because "I'm sold on the people of America—a strong and upstanding people."

David B. Robertson, international president of the brotherhood, declared when he listened to speeches before congress and at political conventions in which "one group tells the other how bad it is, and declares national leaders as incompetent" he wondered how the "national situation" could be worse than it is.

Saying he was proud railroad men and industrialists could sit down and harmoniously discuss their problems, he concluded "the same means used to solve our industrial problems might be employed to a greater extent in solving our national problems."

Bottelton urged adequate preparations. "We are a nation of 150 million people living in a world in which some 450 million give allegiance of sort to one potentate," he said. "We are facing an economic and military future with extreme uncertainty and it is not a pleasant picture."

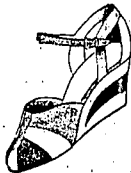
