Shanghai Bills Carry Slogan of 'Down With U.S.'

Japanese Manifest Discontent With American, British Policies In Far East

SHANGHAI, July 9.—The slogan "down with America" was posted in Shanghai's streets today and a Japanese warship emphasized Tokyo's attitude toward England by seizing a British ship in Shanghai's harbor.
These manifestations of Japanese discontent with United States and British policies in the far east coincided with a Japanese protest against the British refusal to close the Burma supply route to China.
The anti-American handbills were posted by "indignant" Japanese patriots," said a Japanese military spokesman, who announced that a man-manifesting of Japanese redoubt tomorrow would be held in the Japanese "insult" to Japanese authority.
The British ship seized here was the 3,000-ton steamer Shenkung, Dornier (the Japanese news agency) charged that she was carrying munitions belonging to "a certain belligerent country" into Japanese-occupied territory.
British sources said that the steaming was carrying off ammunition from the French concession at Tientsin to the French coast. The Japanese had approved her manifest.
Meanwhile reports from Tokyo said Japan is preparing for military action against the British crown colony of Hongkong if Britain persists in refusing to close the Burma route to supplies for the armies of Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

AMERICA-NIPPON SITUATION GRAVE

Patriots expressed in some quarters that the Japanese army might seek to fan the incident into larger proportions in an effort to create a sweeping anti-American movement in the United States.

Both Sides Claim Successes in Conflicting Reports on Fight in Mediterranean

LONDON, July 10 (Wednesday)—British men-of-war clashed early today with an Italian squadron of two battleships, cruisers and destroyers in a continuing sea engagement in the central Mediterranean and jubilantly reported that the enemy "almost immediately" fled behind a smoke screen.

Whether the Italians fired a single shell in the brief fight was not stated in the British admiralty's communique but it declared that before the smoke screen obscured the Italians "one hit at extreme range was obtained by one of our capital ships on an Italian battleship."

The admiralty said its ships were pursuing the Italians. Requests received in London from Stefan, Italian official news agency, said, however, that the British were being pursued by the Italians, and that in a previous engagement near the island of Crete, a British cruiser was sunk and a battleship and aircraft carrier damaged by Italian air bombs.

DICTATORS PLAN BRITAIN BATTLE

Axis Allies Map Blockade of Isles and Defeat of Empire

ROME, July 9.—The axis allies have chosen their respective tasks for the battle of England. It was stated authoritatively tonight.

These broad purposes—determined, presumably, during Italian Foreign Minister Ciano's current trip to Berlin—was made known by the informed writer, Virginia Gayda, to be threefold:

1. Blockade the British Isles.
2. Break Britain's empire contacts.
3. Defeat her "at home, on the water and in the air."

Gayda, who is to strike at Britain in Egypt, the Anglo-Egyptian desert, Kenya colony and British Somaliland, is to be followed by the Italian fleet in the Mediterranean, and above all, to implement a large part of the British fleet in the Mediterranean.

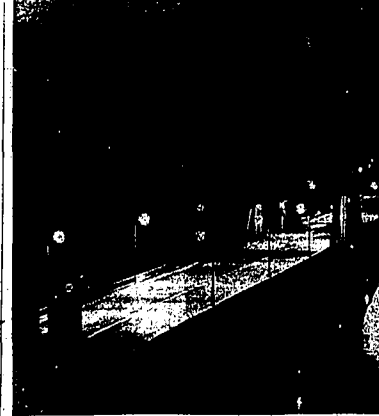

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POPULATION FOR MAGIC VALLEY UP

Count Hits 100,000 Mark, Returns for 1940 Show Gain Consistent

With nearly all Magic Valley communities attaining substantial population increases, according to preliminary 1940 census returns, the nine counties comprising the Magic Valley area now include about 100,000 persons.

Long recognized as the agricultural center of the state, the Magic Valley gains in prestige by this increase of about 25,000 persons over previous estimates. The 1930 census figure, it is based upon preliminary census figures furnished by Earl P. Kramer, Idaho supervisor of the 1940 federal census.

Although the present total is 99,241, it is expected that a slight increase will be shown by final census tabulations from Washington, D. C., so the final population for 1940 will hit the 100,000 mark.

All Magic Valley counties as well as nearly all communities, registered a gain, with the exception of Blaine, which population dropped from 1,411 in 1930 to 1,201 in 1940.

In Owyhee county, from which the Magic Valley draws considerable trade, were included in the valley count, the total would be about 101,277.

A check of county totals shows that Twin Falls county increased from 29,273 to 35,500 between the two population enumerations. Cassia county increased from 12,110 to 14,557; while Blaine's population increased from 1,411 to 1,201. Owyhee county progressed from 9,656 to 8,000 and Gooding county experienced an advance from 1,200 to 1,315. Blaine's count now stands at 1,201, as compared to 1,410 for 1930.

Other counties, with present total, followed by parenthetical notation of the 1930 census figures, follow: Adams, 5,411 (4,491); Blaine, 1,201 (1,411); Lincoln, 4,232 (3,242); and Cassia, 1,201 (1,411).

In Two Estates

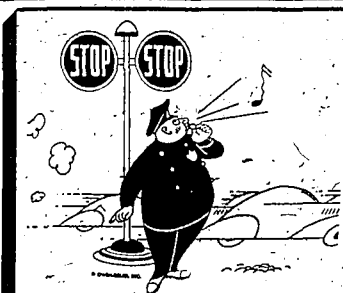
