British Bombers Sweep for Zeroes in War

Roosevelt Seeks 'Total Defense'; Asks 4 Billions

President Declares American Men Will Not Be Sent to Participate in European Wars

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 10.—President Roosevelt, declaring the country must prepare for "total defense," asked congress for \$4,846,171,957 additional for the army and navy today and proclaimed this two-fold policy:

"We will not send our men to take part in European wars. But we will repel aggression against the United States or the western hemisphere."

The huge outlay, which would bring the nation's appropriations and contract authorizations for the armed forces to \$10,100,000,000, is designed to set the nation on its "two-ocean" feet. It would buy for 100,000 of about 20,000 planes and modern weapons and equipment for a land force of 2,000,000.

A measure authorizing the "two-ocean" navy was approved by the senate today. It would provide \$2,000,000,000 and without a single additional cent.

Senator Connally (D.-Tex.), during the debate on the bill, said the debate on the bill, said that "we want to make sure that Europe can't get us if we want to tell the Japs where to get off we can do it."

The measure, authorizing a seven-year building program for 100,000 warships to the fleet, now goes back to the house for action on senate amendments.

In a special message warning of "grave danger to Democratic leadership," Mr. Roosevelt told congress that "this nation through access to the sea and work and unity proposes to remain free."

The pledge that no men would be sent to European wars, immediately, approving response from some of those legislators who have expressed fear that the nation was heading toward war.

"In a great victory for the democracy," Mr. Roosevelt said, "the president has done it."

Senator Wheeler (D.-Mont.), expressed "entire agreement" with the president's statement. "It is a great victory for the democracy," he said, "in that it means that we are going to have a strong 'no-intervention' plank in the platform to the end of the Democratic national convention next week."

On the other hand, some legislators, including Senator Frazer (R.-N.D.), expressed suspicion that the program was "not a total defense" rather than national defense.

The general trend of the comment indicated, however, that congress would accept the president's plan in addition to some defense recommendations to congress. Mr. Roosevelt conferred during the day with treasury officials and representatives of the advisory commission on the questions involved. (Continued on Page 3, Column 3)

300,000 SOUGHT FOR U. S. ARMY

Compulsory Military Training Advocates Propose to Draft Enrollees

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(By The Associated Press)

Advocates of compulsory military training, proposed today to draft 300,000 young men into the army immediately, while their operations and training committee is before congress to legislate against conscription.

Before leaving his senate seat for summer training as an army reserve captain, young Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) introduced a bill to select for one-year enlistments enough men between 21 and 25 to give the nation a peacetime force of 300,000. The force would include men enlisted under existing law.

One of the sponsors of the Burke-Wadsworth compulsory training bill, Greenville Clark, New York lawyer, urged the House military affairs committee that a "very grave immediate threat" makes it "absolutely imperative" to bring 300,000 additional men.

Enforcing the principle of compulsory service, President Roosevelt said in a message requesting nearly \$3,000,000,000 now in armament.

"The congress is now considering the enactment of a system of active and reserve military forces," he said. (Continued on Page 3, Column 3)

Japanese Meeting Demands Apology

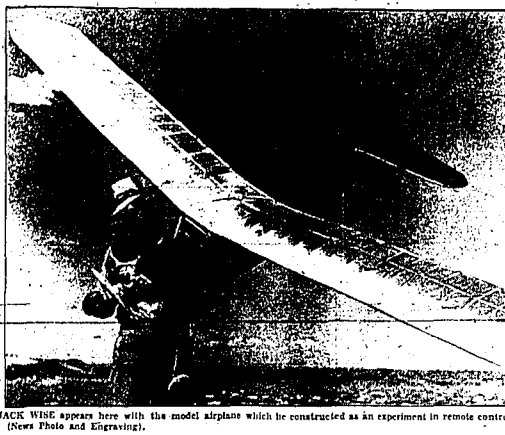
SHANGHAI, July 10.—(By The Associated Press)

Dies Reveals Plot to Damage U. S. Warship

Threat Assertedly Aimed at Philadelphia Navy Yard

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Tex., July 10.—Representative Dies (D.-Tex.), paused today in an investigation of the Kuyfuss-Heuser band, an organization of old Imperial Germany army men—to announce discovery of a sabotage plot against an American man-of-war under construction in the Philadelphia navy yard.

He said agents of the congressional committee investigating an anti-Americanism uncovered the subversive plot.

The committee chairman, who has warned industrialists to guard against saboteurs, said that members of the committee are pressing investigation in other states. He did not elaborate.

Herman Koster, 51, Houston painter contractor, appeared before Dies as a witness during the day.

Koster, who said he lived in Germany, Brazil and China before coming to the United States in 1923, declined to discuss his testimony but gave reporters a statement in which he said:

"My Kuyfuss-Heuser formerly was known at Houston as the Derk-stahlheim, or steel heist."

"There are about 25 members in Houston and some of them have in other cities, chiefly in the east."

The organization is composed of veterans of the old Imperial German army.

"It is a social non-political organization with a 'practical application' mainly social."

The organization has held a meeting with a "practical application" of a social nature.

"I have been in the military of Germany and I am a member of the Kuyfuss-Heuser and occasionally joined it in a friendly group."

He said that after he left he would turn over to an investigation of reported Communist sponsored activities in the maritime and possibly the motion picture industry of California.

HOUSE APPROVES HATCH MEASURE

Bill Passed 243 to 122 After Long Legislative Fight

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(By The Associated Press)

The Hatch bill to curb political activity by certain state employees and limit campaign contributions and expenditures was passed by the house today, 243 to 122, after a long struggle which transcended the measure from a committee bill.

The measure, endorsed by President Roosevelt and Wendell Willkie, Republican presidential nominee, will impose these restrictions: Among others upon the restriction, campaign contributions, and expenditures will be limited to \$5,000 and \$10,000, respectively.

1. State and local employees whose salaries come wholly or in part from federal appropriations (highway department workers, agricultural inspectors and many others) will be subject to the same prohibition which the full-fledged federal employees.

2. Individual political contributions will be limited to \$5,000 and firms which receive any remuneration from federal contracts may not contribute at all.

3. The political parties may spend no more than \$200,000 in their campaigns. In 1932 the Republicans reported an outlay of \$800,000 and the Democrats \$500,000.

The measure, passed by the senate on March 10, now returns there for action on house changes. Legislation to be completed here tomorrow and the bill sent directly to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

Advocates of the measure backtracked virtually every amendment except those of Representative Gumpert (D-N.M.), house sponsor of the legislation.

Swarm on England

Britons Warned Sky-Fighting Hits New Peak As War Official Warns Of Nazi Invasion

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, July 11.—(Thursday)—England on guard and ready, watched through the dawn today without any indication along the coastal no-man's land of Nazi invasion which commences was warned last night might come at daybreak.

Britons speculated whether this warning, by Sir Edward Grigg, undersecretary of state for war, was the authorized first word that the zero hour is near.

Most members of parliament, however, took the statement as only an indication that Britain's defenses are ready and the next German move is awaited.

Sir Edward last night said: "I could think of any of our soldiers will be on the alert, waiting for an attack which may come in several places at dawn."

He spoke while the thunder of bombs and the rattle of machine-guns fired still accompanied the greatest air-fight of the war over England—an attack, which Sir Edward said might be only a prelude to the worst.

British battleships and coastal guns drove the Germans off late in the day after shooting down or disabling 37 of the raiders.

Two days ago President William A. Patterson, United Air Lines told the congress he believed the CAA was "incompetent" and that it had "cut the air transportation industry down the river in exchange for a political job."

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FDR Intervenes To Stop Strike

WASHINGTON, July 10.—(By The Associated Press)

President Roosevelt intervened today to threaten a strike by 30,000 union clerks and terminal workers employed by the Railway Labor Act in a dispute over the creation of a fact-finding commission.

George M. Harrison, president of the AFL Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, announced the organization today that it would go on strike because of failure to adjust a dispute with the express agency over the work of the workers.

Mr. Roosevelt's action is a last resort after a long series of conferences, and has the effect of maintaining the status quo for a maximum of two days.

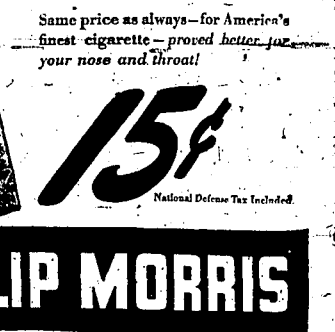

Mediterranean Stroke May Influence Russia and Turkey

BY MIRKLE L. SIMPSON

Europe's war has flamed into action in the Mediterranean theater on British initiative. That is the most salient fact of the current war news, in contrast to the significance of the first breakthrough between British and Italian sea power. German-Italian moves to avert disaster in the Balkan theater have the axis allies, or the intensifying German air and submarine attack on England's sea life.

Italy's British naval success over the whole series of the eastern front. Washington, July 10—An urgent plea that unwarranted hysteria not be allowed to plunge the United States into Europe's war was made in a statement issued today by James S. Kemper, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

"You will agree with me," Mr. Kemper said, "that we cannot afford to be distracted by the call of preparation. But, we do have the right to know that these added costs will not be wasted. And we can think that the objectives made clear to all of us. Further, orderly procedure would seem to indicate that you and I might be made ready to take any such action as we have to take. Let us have done with sabre rattling at least until we have removed the dust, cobwebs and rust from our armor."

Politics and Defense

Attention given to building up political machinery should have been given in recent years to develop, Mr. Kemper declared.

"I think it can be said and properly so," the speaker asserted, "that our country would today be infinitely better off if those who have been spending our billions had devoted even one-tenth of their energies to the building up of political machinery through public speaking. And this is said without reference to the fact that a large part of the billions that have been spent for work—easily could have been used for preparation and with much better effect on the morning of our citizenry."

Hysteria in the present emergency, said the speaker, has no place in the situation.

"America," he insisted, "is not at war. If we think and act calmly and surely we may be saved war's awful toll. It is difficult when we read the newspaper accounts that come to us daily from Europe not to let our imagines overpower our reason. Unless we are careful, much will be added to the rubble and much will be printed which will influence our passions and cloud our judgment."

BUSINESS LEADER HITS AT WARTIME HYSTERIA

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Those who think the preservation of our life is dependent upon American participation in this war are speaking for a national economic structure, he said.

"If we did this unthinkingly—depriving the flower of our youth and scattering the savings of our citizens—who would there be to tend the woods, to dig the soil and help of the type we so generously gave after the war? Who would provide food for those who were hungry, who would fight pestilence and disease and who would have the means with which to re-establish business, industry and agriculture and provide jobs for labor in the countries whose normal functions were completely disrupted by the ravages of war?"

Terrific Toll

Mr. Kemper emphasized the financial effects of German human populations and a national economic structure. He said:

"Speaking for myself I can conceive nothing more destructive to America and American institutions than for us to engage in Europe's present war. Participation would add to our already staggering debt a burden that would so adversely affect our national economy that we would closely approach—not actually experience—economic collapse."

"If national bankruptcy, which comes in many countries in central Europe after the World war, were repeated here it surely would open the door for one man government—call it dictatorship or dictatorship as you will. The answer to the saving of representative government is through participation in this war."

Mr. Kemper stressed the work of the chamber over a period of years in the field of national defense. But, he said:

"Business and industry cannot do this."

U. S., GERMANY BID FOR LATIN

Central Americans Reported Under Strong Nazi Pressure

WASHINGTON, July 10—The United States matched increased German activity in Latin America, according to reports received here today involving hemisphere defense and economic unity.

Central American countries were reported especially to have come under strong German pressure to oppose proposals for creating an American republic into a Commonwealth front at the pan-American conference opening at Havana on July 20.

Countering the German drive, which was believed here to have the full support of Italy and possibly of Japan, United States diplomats were said to have stopped up their own efforts to convince Latin American countries that their future security depended on full cooperation in this hemisphere.

President Roosevelt himself, giving weight to assurances of United States support, declared firmly in his defense message to Congress today that "we will repel aggression against the United States or the western hemisphere."

Without making any formal representations, German diplomats in the Latin American countries were reported to be "explaining the German viewpoint in such a way as to try to raise doubts about the ability and intentions of the United States to defend the other American republics or to bring effective solutions to their economic problems."

Meanwhile in Washington, government officials still worked on to try to raise doubts about the extent of support of Latin American countries.

Doubt was expressed in some quarters, however, that the detailed plan would be ready for submission to the Havana conference.

ATASCADERO, Calif., July 10 (AP)—Jack Harris, 14-year-old pupil at the Hansen Deaconess school, for "maliciously" boy, confessed he fatally beat and attacked 8-year-old Gayle Jones in a football game last night, District Attorney A. H. Brand announced today.

Stole and uncooperates, with her head battered and bleeding, the little girl was found in the canyon near the school. She died at a hospital early this morning. Physicians said she had been originally assaulted.

Brand said the youth made his confession to him and Sheriff Murray C. Halloway after first denying any knowledge of the crime. Pleased for an explanation of a cut on his finger and bloodstained overalls, they finally admitted the attack, he said.

FRANCE TO VOTE ON NEW REGIME

National Assembly in Bitter Dispute Over Blame for Defeat

VICHY, France, July 10 (AP)—After accusations of responsibility for France's defeat by Nazi legions drew the national assembly into an angry session, it formally approved for Premier Marshal Henri Philippe Pétain to form an authoritarian government on the left of France.

The final joint vote of both houses was announced 5:59 to 5:58 P.M. after a long session.

France thus will shortly have a new authoritarian constitution modeled after those of the very axis powers which conquered and enslaved her in 1940.

Laval on Scene

Paul Laval, former foreign minister and prominent in years past of close Franco-Italian relations represented the 84-year-old minister-prime.

Laval said the new constitution would be presented to the people for approval in a national referendum, but he did not say how life would be conducted in divided, impoverished, unoccupied France.

SAVING FIGURED ON FARM LOANS

New Law Reduces Interest on Federal Land Bank Accounts

Approximately \$12,000 will be saved by some 200 farmers and stockmen of Twin Falls county during the next two years as the result of reduced interest rates on many types of Federal land bank and land bank commission loans. J. W. Stobbs, Twin Falls secretary of the National Farm Loan association of National Farm Loan association, following the county, announced last evening.

Legislation adopted recently by Congress and approved by President Roosevelt, fixes the interest rate on the next two years' advances on both loans, with a special rate of 3 1/2 per cent annually. Land bank loans made since 1917 have been written at varying rates of interest, but average about 5 per cent. Land bank commission loans made since 1923 have been written at a 5 per cent rate.

The 3 1/2 per cent rate on land bank loans, was explained as a continuation of a rate that has been in effect since 1934. The new rate on commission loans, from one-half to one per cent from the interest rate on the same type of a 4 per cent having been in effect on these loans for some time.

The Twin Falls National Farm Loan association office services approximately \$5,750,000 in land bank and land bank commission loans. The annual savings in Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon, the territory served by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, will be in excess of \$2,000,000, McDowell estimated.

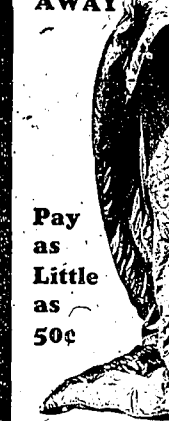
