

DEFENSE PLAN
SEES 25,000
NEW PLUMES

Commission Says Contracts
Totalling Hundred Millions
Have Been Awarded Since
Funds Available July 1

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 11.—Working toward a goal of 25,000 new warplanes in the next two years, the national defense commission announced today that \$100,000,000 worth of contracts had been awarded since July 1, when funds for the expansion program became available.

Officials said the fact that competitive bidding was not required had assisted them in launching the program rapidly. First plane deliveries are expected by early fall.

Army, Navy Cooperate
Dr. George J. Mead, aeronautics adviser to the committee, declared that a great commission today that representatives of the army and navy, aircraft manufacturing companies and the national advisory committee for aeronautics and the Reconstruction Finance corporation had met Tuesday and had agreed on a program of air defense cooperation.

The following steps were taken:

1. Army and navy representatives agreed to standardize their specifications for aircraft, and to coordinate their plans, rather than to carry on independently.
2. Representatives of the industry agreed to coordinate their plans, rather than to carry on independently.
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Loans for Expansion
1. The Reconstruction Finance corporation agreed to make loans immediately available for this expansion.

The national advisory committee for aeronautics announced that it had begun work on new research facilities at Langley field, near Alexandria, Va., to improve the design of the airplane it already has.

Congress, meanwhile, completed work on the \$400,000,000 national defense program, which will be available for the next two years.

The state appropriations committee approved an appropriation of \$25,000,000 for further development of power resources in the Tennessee valley area, which was explained, was necessary to speed production of defense materials, particularly aluminum.

James H. Jones, federal land administrator, told reporters that the LPO had made four loans aggregating \$16,000,000 to private industry in connection with the defense program. He did not identify the companies.

Hostage Program

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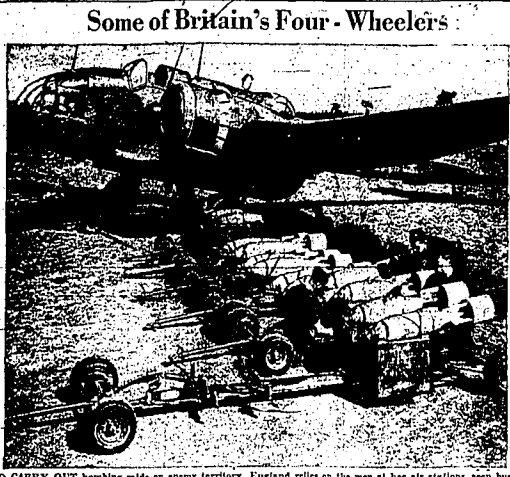

Hull Lashes at German Move in Latin America

U. S. Secretary of State Charges Attempt at Intimidation, Demands Hanks Off Conference

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 11.—Secretary of State Hull, accusing Germany of an apparent attempt to intimidate Latin American countries, indicated plainly today that non-American powers should keep hands off the forthcoming Pan-American conference at Havana.

The conference was called with the view of solidifying a united front of the 21 American Republics for defense and economic cooperation in view of developments in Europe.

At a press conference, a reporter asked Hull about dispatches reporting that German diplomats had "warned" Latin American countries against taking any action at Havana should directly or indirectly against Germany.

Hull said he had heard something of this nature. "The fact," he asserted, "was to be an inter-American affair held by agreement of the American nations to consider matters of common interest and to give the fullest respect to every other country."

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Secretary Hull himself plans to head the United States delegation to the conference.

Indication that consideration was being given to some form of mandate or protectorate over certain European possessions in this hemisphere came from Hull when the statement was called to a statement yesterday by Foreign Minister Aulic of Brazil.

Hull said he always had respect for the views of America, who formerly was Brazilian ambassador to the United States.

TEGUIGUAGALPA, Honduras, July 11.—A German paper of "intervention" has not changed the attitude of the five Central American republics in the Havana conference of American "American" nations, according to a statement by the foreign ministry today.

The ministry said the German newspaper, "Die Welt," had published a statement that the five Central American republics had agreed to accept German demands for a protectorate over the region.

Officials emphasized that the delegates had been instructed to support the United States position.

The ministry said Reinke's note stated that he acted on instructions of his government.

Big Toll by U-Boats

(By The Associated Press)
BERLIN, July 11.—Germany proclaimed tonight that her U-boats, bent on a starvation blockade of England, had exceeded even the rate of the imperial Germany's unrestricted undersea campaign of the World War in destruction of British ships and British food.

In the six-weeks period ended July 9, said a communiqué, 60,000 tons of "enemy commercial shipping" was sent to the bottom by submarines, and this quick tempo was attributed to the "unbearable losses" which the U-boats acquired on the English channel and Atlantic coasts after knocking out France.

The claimed rate of destruction was more than 100,000 tons a week.

The authoritative commentary service Deutscher Rundfunk asserted 3,000,000 tons of neutral and "enemy" vessels had been destroyed.

"The British, who lost 1,000,000 tons in the entire World War, have acknowledged losses in the present war which total nearly 1,000,000 tons."

On the home of common today, R. A. Hutton, minister of agriculture, said Britain had maintained its milk supply, its cattle and sheep supplies had been increased, its meat on the hoof and a large additional store of cereals.

"Nevertheless," he declared, the country's food supply was "unusually more serious than in 1914 and food production in the next year will be increased by five million tons (of wheat)."

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German Peace Policy Accepted in Balkins
Hungary and Bulgaria Postpone Territorial Claims on Rumania

BUDAPEST, July 11.—The precarious peace of southeastern Europe, hanging by a thread since Russia's Bessarabian grab, seemed assured of at least temporary continuance tonight.

Hungary and Bulgaria again have postponed their territorial claims on Rumania.

To maintain southeastern Europe on a full production basis for the Nazi war machine during the battle to conquer Britain.

Then Russian spokesmen in Turkey declared it was "erroneous" to believe that the British had received a pressing claim on Turkey.

In Istanbul the Turkish government denied general mobilization and declared that the call of the president for a general mobilization was a "hoax."

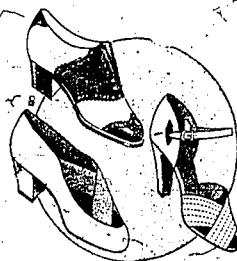
