
TROUBLE SEEN IN CUBA ELECTIONS

'Strong Man' Followers Oppose Demands to Suspend Voting

HAVANA, July 13.—The possibility of serious trouble in Cuba's general election tomorrow developed tonight as the partisans of Cuba's "strong man," Colonel Fulgencio Batista, opposed demands of his rival candidate for the presidency, Dr. Ramon Grau San Martín, that voting be suspended in a half-dozen sections.

A letter was reported in many quarters that if more suspensions were granted, Batista, backed by the army, would exercise control of the government in a coup d'état on the day that only one candidate could be elected.

Gratuities were reported to be being paid to Batista's followers in the provinces. Batista's election could authorize the supreme electoral body to suspend elections if it believes orderly voting cannot be held or that undesirable elements are being put on voters by armed forces, or in cases where constitutional guarantees are suspended.

President Laredo Jui, a Batista-made candidate, himself, said: "Gratuities are being paid to Batista's followers, an internecine war has been declared with Batista and Grau."

The result of the balloting is of interest to the United States because of Cuba's strategic value in protection of the Panama canal and because the United States has agreed to see it fortified for that purpose. The United States may have a Caribbean base here.

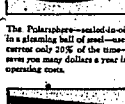
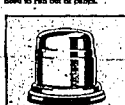

BIG STAKES SEEN
IN HAVANA MEETAmerican Republics to Settle
Barter, Fifth Column
Problems

By ALBERT D. WEST

Latin America's Outlook

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The independence of Latin American republics may well be the high stakes on the board when the statisticians of the American republics all meet at the Havana conference today.

Summoned to the conference by the United States, they face critical problems in almost every phase of their national and international life.

Politically—There is the problem of a Nazi-Fascist barter system in future overseas commerce.

Economically—There is the problem of a barter system in future overseas commerce.

Militarily—The vital question of the future of French and Dutch possessions in the western hemisphere, and their effect on continental defense.

Second Conference

When Cuban Secretary of State Miguel Angel Camino opens the plenary session in the imposing Havana capitol, it will be the first time foreign ministers of the 21 new world nations have sought together because of dire economic wars.

The first time hostilities had just flared across the Atlantic, and the ministers' goal was to keep the war away from these shores. A new desire in international relations—neutrality zone—resulted.

The conference will present a unified front to the world in a foreign conclusion in Washington diplomatic circles. One informed source has predicted that the meeting would enunciate a brilliant decision of hemisphere unity and courage to commit the task of providing means of meeting the various economic political problems.

Nevertheless an ambitious program encompassing all the pertinent issues before the Americas has been drafted by United States Secretary of State Cordell Hull and the diplomats of the other 20 republics.

It calls for study of the problems which may confront the nations in case the sovereignty now exercised by non-Americans over new world colonies is relinquished, issues which are materially impaired.

Cuba has proposed a Pan-American mandate over these areas as the answer to the problem.

Special Problem

Foreign Minister Jose Maria Calles of Argentina has declared that his country considers the new special problem the status of the British-owned Falkland Islands, off the tip of South America.

By congressional resolution and a measure to the senate, power, the United States has reaffirmed and implemented the Monroe Doctrine's opposition to transfer of British, French or Dutch possessions to any other non-American power.

To evolve a hemisphere answer to this question, the foreign ministers face the task of correlating these and other views.

The agenda attacks the "fifth column" problem by calling for an "exchange of information on activities" in any country "that tend to endanger the common American democratic ideal."

Consideration of the United States' projected inter-American pact to handle exports of the hemisphere is expected to constitute the conference's approach to the economic problem.

What course the conference will take on continental defense has been a subject of speculation. Some have advanced the possibility of action looking toward definite defense pacts, but others scoff at the idea as impractical.

The agenda recommends a study of the policy of the Americas as neutrals which was enunciated at Panama. There the foreign ministers set up rules of conduct which among other things would prevent belligerents from using strategic, maritime and aerial territories as bases of operations, would prohibit "militaristic acts by citizens, and would ban recruiting in their countries by warring nations.

MAY BE GROWINGCensus Statistician Figures
Shift in American
Population

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The rural life of this large nation is taking a new turn, according to a report by the census statistician.

Dr. Louis E. Thurwell, chief statistician, is reporting on the survey to that question from the release of the 1940 census.

This much is definite from the facts he already has compiled:

Cities with more than 25,000 persons show a gain of less than five per cent during the decade ending April 1, compared with an increase of more than 20 per cent in the 10 years before that.

The population of the country as a whole, based on birth and death statistics, apparently increased about 4 per cent during the last 10 years.

There has been an upward trend in suburban living during the past decade.

Dr. Thurwell says:

"We know that the growth trend that once was greatest in the cities now is obviously some place else—suburban or the wide open spaces."

We will know more when all the primary census data from all states is completed about Aug. 20.
