E. F. Prater Appointed to Fill Post Left Vacant by Meffan Slaying

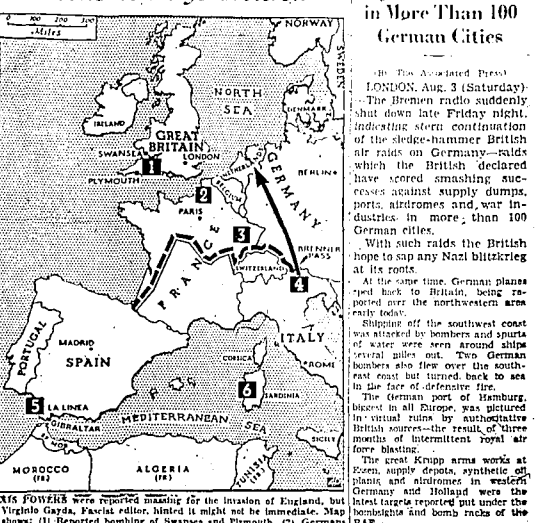

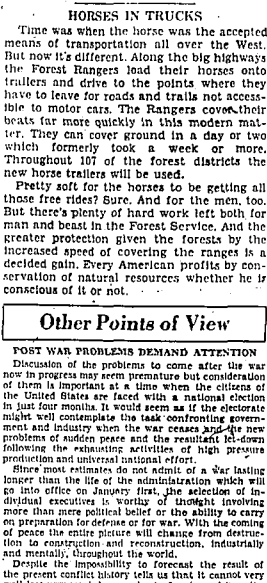

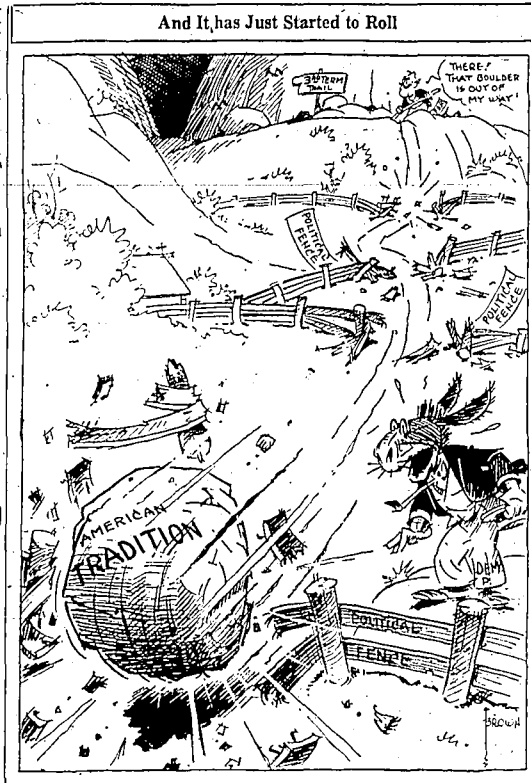
