House Approves Mobilization of Guards, 342 to 32

Measure Goes Back to Senate for Action on Amendments; Effort to Restrict Service Crushed

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15—The house passed the national guard mobilization bill by a whopping 342 to 32 vote today, after crushing an effort to restrict the service of millitiamen and reserve officers to the continental United States and its possessions and territories.

The measure went back to the senate for action on minor amendments. It found that chamber busily debating the peace-time conscription law and discussing a report that Great Britain had offered to place the United States in return for much needed American destroyers.

As it stood, approved by both branches, the national guard bill would exempt men with dependents, but other millitiamen and reserves would be subject at the call of the president to a year's compulsory service anywhere in the world. Somewhere, the American possessions and the Philippine Islands.

Quick action was taken in the measure by the house of such an important nature that it required either ready approval of them by the senate, or quick action in conference to bring the measure to the United States for no naval bases, in return for 60 or more destroyers.

FIRE SPREADS IN NORTHERN IDAHO

Strong Wind Drives Flames Through 10,000 Acres of Timber

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 15 (AP)—Pushed by a strong northwesterly wind, a big fire in the Nez Perce National Forest of northern Idaho advanced over new yellow pine stands today. The blaze, ignited by lightning last Saturday, has burned over 10,000 acres.

The Nez Perce fire was the largest series of flaming outbreaks stretching through dry Rocky Mountain timber country from the Canadian boundary down to Colorado. In the Teton national forest of western Wyoming a suburb fire on Fox creek, northeast of Moran, swept on beyond control.

IDAHO INCREASES LIQUOR PROFITS

State Dispensary Chalks Larger Take on Same Volume

BOISE, Aug. 15 (AP)—A 30 per cent increase in profits of the state liquor dispensary was chalked up in the first six months of 1940 compared to the first half of last year, but the amount of liquor sold was approximately the same.

Manager C. O. Wright, reporting on the figures today, said net profit for the period was \$114,427, an increase of \$26,685 over the 1939 half-year.

Gross sales amounted to \$1,072,871, an increase of \$65,239 over the 1939 first half, but the cost of stock dropped \$505.

The increased profit, Wright said, was due in large part to an average 5 per cent mark-up insured by the Idaho liquor board last November.

Reduction of operating expenses amounted to \$1,275 as compared to the previous period.

The dispensary distributed \$392,934 to various state and county funds during the six months.

The largest allocation for any one quarter to date was that of the first three months 1940, amounting to \$264,947.

In the quarter ending June 30 1940, 97 per cent was allocated to the counties and 50 per cent to the state general fund.

Total liquor funds distributed since inception of the liquor commission in 1923 amount to \$2,417,438.

Airports in Communities With Training Courses Favored

BOISE, Aug. 15 (AP)—Dean W. Miller, Idaho wars projects administrator, predicted today there would be but a "very slight chance" of receiving additional funds for national defense projects in Idaho.

Back from Washington, D. C., where he conferred with regional and Washington WPA and War Relocation Authority officials, Miller said "some few projects in the state may be designated as necessary for national defense, but they will all require adequate local sponsorship and adequate financial resources to carry out any additional federal funds."

"The same condition," he said, "will apply to most of the intermountain section."

The present Idaho program will be planned so as to give preference for operation to airports and training courses, Miller said, but he said, "we will have to depend on local sponsorship and our own state WPA funds for financing these projects."

Almost certain of receiving designation for defense projects are airports in communities having aviation training courses. These, however, will not receive additional federal funds other than that normally allocated for the project.
