Bradley Admits Club Has Chance To Win Pennant

President of Tribe Watches Clerks Open Letters

CLEVELAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—You couldn't blame Alvin Bradley for having that gleam in his eye today.

After all, the Cleveland Indians' white-haired president is a business man. He knows there are 80,000 seats in Cleveland's municipal stadium, and that the tribe has a serious case of pennant and world series fever.

Four clerks were busy opening requests for world series tickets as Bradley, whose personal holdings in real estate, dropped in at the Indians' front office to keep an eye on things.

Bradley noticed that 2,000 letters had been received. He calculated, too, that 2,000 letters were already mailed. He figured the world series tickets—most of them in the last week—were in Cleveland hands—pushed—about 100,000.

Bradley said the letter-writing was receiving numbers. "Ticket requests for the series, if there is one, will be received in Cleveland," he said. "I'll take care of the 3,000 people who are with us all the time—right now."

Bradley takes as something of a diplomat. He smiled, at least outwardly, when he was asked to flare a couple of months ago against Manager Oscar Vitt. The players' reaction was that Vitt had fired because he was making them "jitters."

Bradley's march out of the office, one of the letter-opening undertones said he, at least, was certain the pennant in Cleveland had just passed, among others from such far-away states as Florida, a reception in Detroit, Pa.
