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NEW BLAZES IN WAKE OF STORM

At Least 17 New Fires Reported in Boise National Forest

BOISE, Aug. 24 (AP)—A thunderstorm, bringing lightning storm swept over Boise national forest today, starting at least 17 fires in timber areas.

At the same time it was reported that new fires in the Boise national forest, which had given forest officials trouble for the past four days, were well under control.

Most of the new blazes in Boise forest, although they required removal of all available regular fire crews, were not regarded as incendiary in major importance.

Walter Berry, fire warden, said two of them appeared to be more dangerous than the others. They were on Big Butte, crest of tributary of the Boise river, and on Look creek, a tributary of the north fork of the river. This latter fire was centered about nine miles south and west of Deer park ranger station.

Some rain fell in the forest, causing the fire hazards slightly to abate. It was speedy and gave no general relief.

Thomas Van Meter, Pacific supervisor, reported from Casada that an additional 250 recruits had been taken from the Boise national forest which swept over 1,200 acres. Yesterday 150 men were released.

One fire, located near a fire dispatcher here, reported a fire on Hazel Creek creek, 10 to 15 miles southwest of Boise. It said it was raging over an acre about two miles in length and that 10 civilian conservation corps men and four foremen were on the scene.

BURGLAR MAKES HAUL AT STORE

Trading Post Raider Gets Away With Guns, Knife and Watches

Police officers yesterday said that Rex Trading Post, Twin Falls, had been entered early Saturday morning for the third time this year, with nine guns, a hunting knife, several watches, a quantity of ammunition and a cheap black suitcase being taken.

Entrance was gained by removing a pane of glass from a rear window. The time the entrance was entered, police caught the burglar as he climbed through the window and at the same time he entered the police again made an arrest, and that man is now in the state prison.

WAGE-HOUR LAW CAMPAIGN SLATED

Administrator Orders Drive for Compliance in Five Industries

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—A nation-wide drive for compliance with the wage and hour law in five manufacturing industries—garments, leather goods and luggage, boots and shoes, hardware and wooden goods—was ordered today by Commerce Secretary Philip B. Fleming, was-hour administrator.

The labor department agency instructed 237 inspectors to move into the field Monday to check more than 500 factories in all parts of the country to ascertain the extent of their compliance with minimum wage and maximum hour standards.

In ordering the broad campaign, Fleming emphasized that a majority of the factories to be inspected "are in the country," they are complying with the law.

The objective of the drive, he explained, was to bring the minority into line and to protect fair employers' threatened with cut-throat competition from those disobeying the law.

This will be the wage-hour administration's first multiple-industry enforcement campaign, and the second of a nationwide scale. The agency has already completed a check on the lumber industry.

TAYLOR DETAILS ECONOMIC VIEWS

Democratic Nominee for Senate Declares War on Profit System

ORANGEVILLE, Idaho, Aug. 24 (AP)—"The new day is not cure the fundamental law affecting our economy but it has saved us from revolution and Communism or Fascism," Glen Taylor, Democratic nominee for United States senator said tonight in an address before delegates to the Idaho Young Democratic club convention.

Accepting his party's designation as candidate for the senate, the Peacetime leader performer and actor said "The profit system is a system of greed and selfishness. Two Essentials "This system depends upon money in circulation to keep it going. To keep money circulating you must have two things—a steady expansion to provide increasing opportunities, so money will not stagnate in banks, and there must be jobs for the people so they can buy the goods they produce."

President Roosevelt, he said, took over the presidency "just when we were on the verge of collapse and by courageous measures he stemmed the tide and saved us from disaster. That was the greatest opportunity the people ever had to throw off the profit system."

"Everybody was thinking in terms of profit—there was no wide understanding of our system among the people, no popular demand for a change," said President Roosevelt, "the only thing possible—he set about trying to save the profit system."

"We can't balance the budget and we can't go on spending so I think the only way we can get out of our new ways of doing things," President Roosevelt had held the bridge head for eight years, he can possibly hold it for another four. If by that time we haven't found the answer to our troubles we will go the way of France."

"The choice is plain before us—we can go on with our present uncooperative society where the people own the means of production, and by planning on a national scale put all our people to work producing the abundance that is possible in this country... or we can delay too long and join the parade of the dictators back to the dark ages."

"The present scandalous condition of our country is a result of the profit system."

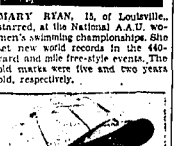

The Literary Guidepost

By JOHN SELBY

“ENGINEERS OF DEMOCRACY,” by Roger Burlingame, (Harcourt, \$2.50).

It is the fashion at the moment to retail history in terms of something specific—of oceans, of rivers, of the eyes of special groups, such as the inhabitants of a given state of the union. Roger Burlingame has done so in terms of technologists.

The first result of his work was a novel called "Masters of the Steam Men," in which he labored to show how the states had been united by the development of the steamship, the telegraph, the railroad and a number of individual inventions and technical techniques. Today there is a second book which tells the story of American development from, approximately, the War Between the States to the present. "Engineers of Democracy," he calls it, and it is both readable and intensely interesting. There are those who may insist that invention and improved technique, rather than history, is a development as such, but certainly a writer may choose his viewpoint in a well-justified defense. It is.

What this reader found most useful in the book is the research Mr. Burlingame has done into the mechanics of certain epochal inventions—the electric street car, for example, the incandescent light, the airplane and a good many others. This research has not only put three masters into reach with perspective, but done a certain amount of debunking. Mr. Burlingame is by William I. 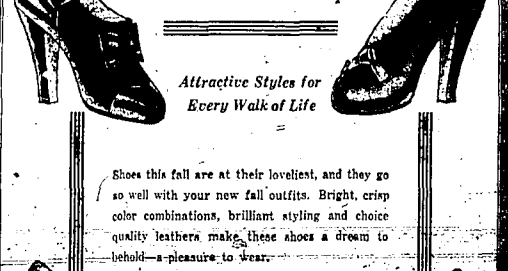

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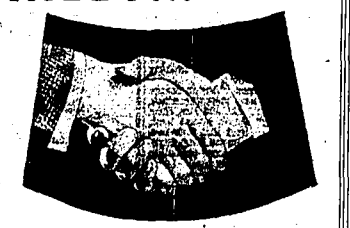

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LIQUOR QUESTION TAKEN TO COURTS

Grocerymen Challenge Constitutionality of Local Option Initiative

BOISE, Aug. 24.—The question as to whether or not Idaho voters may pass judgment on a "local option" liquor control initiative measure at the general election in November was in the hands of the courts tonight.

Challenged in an Ada county circuit court suit filed by W. E. Henke and Chester H. Hageman, both grocerymen, was the constitutionality of the so-called county intoxicating liquor control act. Although brought directly only against this measure, a companion bill, the state liquor act, has also been attacked by the suit.

Named as defendants are Otto F. Peterson, Ada county auditor; and the county's three commissioners, Maudie E. K. Kendall and K. L. McBurney.

Termed unconstitutional, the plaintiffs seek to enjoin officials from transmitting copies of the local option initiative measure to the voters and to prevent them from having the measure printed on the election ballots.

The complaint charged among other things, that:

"Any election upon the initiative would be void because of the situation gave the legislature sole and exclusive power to control, regulate and prohibit the sale, keeping for sale and transportation of intoxicating liquors."

"That it is unconstitutional because it purports to repeat or repeat other liquor laws passed by the legislature."

"That it is unconstitutional because it purports that a person in a witness case may be compelled to be a witness against himself."

"That it places the burden of proof on the defendant in a criminal action and deprives such defendant of a trial by jury."

Cost estimated at \$1,000.

That money used to send copies of the initiative measure to voters and would be lost to taxpayers of Ada county and could not be recovered. The plaintiffs estimated it would cost the county \$1,190 to distribute the initiative measures, which are joined together in one pamphlet.

That the local option initiative did not carry sufficient signatures on its petitions to warrant its inclusion on the ballot. It was alleged that 4,300 of the purported signatures on the petitions were those of non-registered voters.

The petition carried, ostensibly, the names of 18,727 voters. The required number was 18,450 (one-tenth of the 185,400 votes cast for governor at the last election).

If on judgment it is found that the local option initiative violates the constitution because it strips powers of the legislature, then the so-called initiative would also fail because it would usurp these powers, attorneys said.

The local option measure would provide for the setting up, if approved at special elections, of districts within the state where the sale of liquor would be prohibited.

HANSEN MAN DECLARED HERO IN RIVER TRAGEDY

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 24.—Glen R. Hyde and his wife, Idaho people, were declared heroes in the Colorado river steamboat tragedy a dozen years ago.

Various theories have been advanced through the years—that they tumbled into the swirling water from a rocking boat; that they escaped from the stream and were devoured by wild animals; that they wandered into the desolation along the Arizona-Utah border and died of thirst; that they were slain by a toad.

But today a new explanation was offered—that Hyde died a hero, trying to rescue his bride of a few weeks from drowning.

Evidence gleaned from the Hyde home—single socks, which was discovered by a Colorado mail carrier, convinced Bert Loper, veteran Salt Lake City fireman, that the couple died together in the raging waters of the Grand Canyon in Arizona.

"The Hyde's job showed he was a brave, courageous man caught off balance the day before they disappeared," said Loper, who has investigated the Colorado matter since Hyde saved himself but I believe the following day Mrs. Hyde's sweep
