TROOPS MOVED IN MEXICAN REVOLT

Clash Reported Between Followers of Almazan and Government

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Mexican military government and political quarters tonight described the New York statement of General Juan Almazan as a "deliberate attempt to stir up a revolution" and a "deliberate attempt to stir up a revolution."

Almazan called the Mexican people to rebellion until tomorrow without receiving an answer.

The Almazan movement is in arms and we don't see how they can fail to unleash their declaration of war against the government.

There were credible reports that troops were being moved toward northern Mexico where General Almazan has been following, particularly in the states of Durango, Chihuahua, Sonora and Nuevo Leon.

Reliable political sources reported that General Almazan had been proclaimed president of Mexico at a secret session of his committee in Mexico City.

Earlier issued the manifesto calling upon the Mexican people to be ready to sacrifice for the cause of democracy.

Cloudburst Sends Arkansas River and Tributaries on Rampage

PAWNEE, Okla., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Cloudburst sent the Arkansas river and many of its small creek tributaries in northeastern Oklahoma on a rampage today, chasing more than 100 families from their homes in floodplains and isolating several towns.

The Arkansas rose from 143 feet to 148 feet in eight hours. Flood stage is 16 feet. Police called for boats to aid in evacuation of families in the flood's path.

The area along the Arkansas from Tulsa northward has been the scene of the storm.

Governor Phillips ordered out Tulsa national guardmen to patrol the flood area.

TWO CANDIDATES FACE PENALTIES

Gossett, Campbell Fail to
File Campaign Expense
Reports

BOISE, Sept. 4 (AP)—Failure to file statements of their campaign expenses within the authorized time limit as required by law may cost Charles C. Gossett of Nampa his Democratic nomination as lieutenant governor and Stewart Campbell of Boise his Republican nomination as state treasurer.

Secretary of State George H. Curtis reported today the two candidates had not yet filed. Deadline was 5 p. m. Tuesday. There is still a possibility the candidates may have sent their statements by mail, and if such statements are postmarked before the deadline they probably will be accepted, he indicated.

All Notified
The law provides that statements of personal expenses of each candidate must be filed with the secretary of state "not more than 20 days after date of holding the nominating election."

Curtis said his office had notified all candidates that the statements must be filed with him within the time limit as set by law.

Penalties for failure to file within the time limit is listed as an indictable misdemeanor and upon conviction subjects the violator to a fine not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than 30 days nor more than six months. It further provides the violator shall be "ineligible to become a candidate for the office to which he aspires," and that his name shall not appear on the official ballot.

Attorney's View
Attorney General J. W. Taylor said informally the secretary of state could not deny the name of any candidate to the general election ballot if he violated the law relating to filing of campaign accounts.

The law provides that a person shall be declared and filed by the state election commission.

Curtis said he did not know what action he would take. He indicated that if the law had been violated he would ask for an opinion from Attorney General Taylor.

Neither Campbell nor Gossett could be reached for comment tonight. Gossett was reported to be on a trip to Enterprise, Ore.

STATE PRISON'S FUNDS RUN LOW

Only \$8,000 Remains to Operate Institution Rest of Year

BOISE, Sept. 4 (AP)—Because only about \$8,000—enough to last approximately a month—is on hand to keep the Idaho penitentiary operating, the institution may be financed for the remainder of this year on an interim basis, state officials said today.

Attorney General J. W. Taylor, in an informal opinion, has expressed the view that registered warrants may be issued against the special redemption fund during the current emergency.

He is studying, however, a plan to have the matter placed before the state supreme court for a final decision.

Secretary of State George H. Curtis said the last session of the legislature failed to appropriate sufficient funds for the prison and added that if a special session of the legislature was found to be necessary, the cost would be in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

Every effort will be made by board members, he said, to avoid calling a special session.

IDAHO'S RELIEF COSTS INCREASE

New Federal Regulations
Reflected in Growing
Expenditures

BOISE, Sept. 4 (AP)—Due largely to provisions of the federal social security act, Idaho's relief costs are increasing. The maximum grant for old age assistance and the increase in the size limit for dependent children on public aid rolls, Idaho public assistance payments equaled for the current July, it was reported today by W. C. Child, division director.

During the month, his report said, \$219,612.38 was obligated for all categories of public assistance in the state, an increase of \$1,762.46 over the June total and a gain of \$37,218.19 or 13.11 per cent over the July, 1939 amount.

Assistance payments for old age and to dependent children the report went on, were increased while those for aid to the blind and for direct relief decreased.

An amendment to the social security act, it was pointed out, has lifted the maximum monthly payment for old age assistance from \$20 to \$40 a month and the age limit for dependent children receiving public assistance has been raised from 16 to 18 years.

Three factors have gradually contributed to increased relief costs, Child said. He added, however, that the "saturation point" should be reached within a few months.

July old-age assistance payments totaled \$19,411 in June and \$19,810 in July, 1939.

Dependent children payments increased \$5,951 in July, 1939; \$62,059 in June and \$71,208 in July, 1939.

And in the blind roll, \$45,075 in July, 1939; \$45,119 in June and \$45,143 in July, 1939.

In July of this year, direct relief cost \$32,604 as compared to \$32,259 a month earlier and to \$25,227 in July, 1939.

Average grant per month per child for aid to dependent children in Idaho is \$2.25 as compared to \$2.10 in July, 1939.
